The first car belonging to Seymour Carroll, field secretary of the American Humane Education Society of Boston, with southern field headquarters at Greenville, S. C., was taken from Eagle and Market street while the humane secretary was at the Mt. Zion Church services. The theft was reported to the police department and the car was recovered on Cox Avenue by special officers of the police department. The second car lost was reported yesterday afternoon. The car is owned by Dr. L. O. Miller, physician and surgeon. His car was in front of his office. He stated that he was out of the car but a little while before he returned and his car was missing. So far Dr. Miller has not found it.
