ZION BAPTIST CHURCH NEWS.

After the sermon a score or more of white and colored prisoners, rushed to the platform to shake hands with the speaker, asking that he come every Sunday.

Services over in the prison chapel, Pastor White went with Chaplain Dr. J. Dean Crain over to the "death house" and there held a brief service with those who are condemned to die in the electric chair. There were the two Lowman boys from Monetta, and one white man Bigham from Florence.

At 11:30 the Pastor preached to a full house, from Ex. 16: "For this cause have I raised thee up, that I might show forth my power in thee." This message was red hot, from the throne. Big Zion was stirred from pulpit to the door. Just afterwards the funeral services of Sister Florence Carter took place. Dr. R. W. Baylor assisting the pastor. Dr. Baylor preached a soul stirring sermon from John 14:3. The pastor closing out a brief resume of the life of the deceased. Sister Carter was an unassuming, good quiet, faithful member, an excellent neighbor, and true friend, she left two brothers and a sister and a host of other relatives

and friends. A large number of the members left the church and motored up to the St. Peter's Baptist Church, 10 miles from Columbia on the Columbia-Newberry paved road to be at the Gethsemane Baptist Union and Sunday School Convention. The ground was crowded with people and automobiles. Pastor White took the reins in hand no sooner than when he struck the ground because he is the President and closed out one of the best sessions in the history of the Union.

REV. R. M. MYERS WRITES OF HIS TRIP AND MEETINGS.

Editor of The Leader:
Allow me space to speak of how the Lord has blessed the churches where I preached the gospel. Monday after the third Sunday found me at Denmark, Rev. C. E. McLester, the efficient pastor. The deacons and all the friends around there tell

me that he has done more to build up that church than any other man that has been there. When the church was gone down he brought it back to life. Rev. Hall says, the Rev. McLester will not be able to tell the good he has done in Rome Baptist church. We got 52 accessions. We stopped with Deacon E. D. Fost, the richest colored man in that county. He has several plantations and runs 14 plows. He is very loving to his pastor. His wife Mrs. E. D. Fost is the power behind the throne. They know how to treat visitors at their home. Fost said he used to work for 50c a day. His share crop hands said he is a good man.

On August 24, found us at Red Hill Baptist church, at Gadsden, S. C., Rev. R. W. Jenkins pastor. Rev. Jenkins is indisposed and has been for three months. He was not able to be out with me a night. Rev. Jenkins is a life-long friend of mine. I took his work in hand with the help of the members and a couple of deacons and my elder brother to my back and put over the program. On Wednesday night, five car loads of my members including the Jubilee choir were down to the meeting. Those people were enjoyed by all that were there. They woke old Red Hill church up. Forty candidates were received for baptism. The pastor said he has been knowing the church from his boyhood days, he never has known it to receive as many candidates in any one meeting. On Friday night collection surpassed any one in revival meeting. He is a little better, and we hope for him a speedy recovery. He is the father of that illustrious L. C. Jenkins, which any church would be honored to have as pastor. The colored people of Gadsden are together. There are a great deal of land owners. Deacon B. W. Dowdy and Trustee Webber seem to be the prosperous men around there now, since the death of Collins. Mrs. Laura Taylor, Mr. John Carter, Mr. P. J. Taylor and others too numerous to mention are land-owners.

I stopped at the home of Mr. P. R. Webber, his wife was away to the mountains on her vacation, but I was treated fine by Mr. Webber and his two sons John and Paul. Paul is a student at State College. The house girl of Mrs. Webber, Miss Josephine Adams, is the daughter of the Saint Jim Adams and treated us very kind. Webber is a merchant, runs an ice house and shere crops. He is a real business man. Twenty colored men, of which he is treasurer and others president and board of directors have the finest gin in that county. They gin cotton for white and colored. Dr. Collins, Mr. Counts and others are land-owners. It will really please you to see how those colored people get along down there. Sad to say, it seems like all of them stick together better than some of the men of Columbia. The spirit seems to exist in Columbia, if I can't you shall not.

We pulled off the Rich Fool at Wesley church Monday night. The Pastor and Mr. I. S. Leevy said it was quite enjoyable. It would do to be staged at any church. We realized the handsome sum of \$40.00. And if the pastor and myself had not been out of the city, we would have raised \$100.00.
