Continued from Page 1. "the nigger I whipped yesterday?" he inquired. Granderson Goolsby replied: "That is my son. I brought him down here to reason with him, talk it over and give you satisfaction." Villipigue said: "No. Look out, I am going to kill him," immediately firing two shots from a pistol. Goolsby then took a rifle from his buggy and shot the white man.

Granderson Goolsby was subsequently lynched by a mob. The son, Ulysses Goolsby, who had been beaten, testified he had never before seen the white man who assaulted him, that he had done his utmost to get his buggy out of the way on the road. He said at his trial:

"I was seventeen years old, and I never gave a white man a cross word, I had nothing in my heart against anybody. I never had as much as you could

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF OLIVE BRANCH.

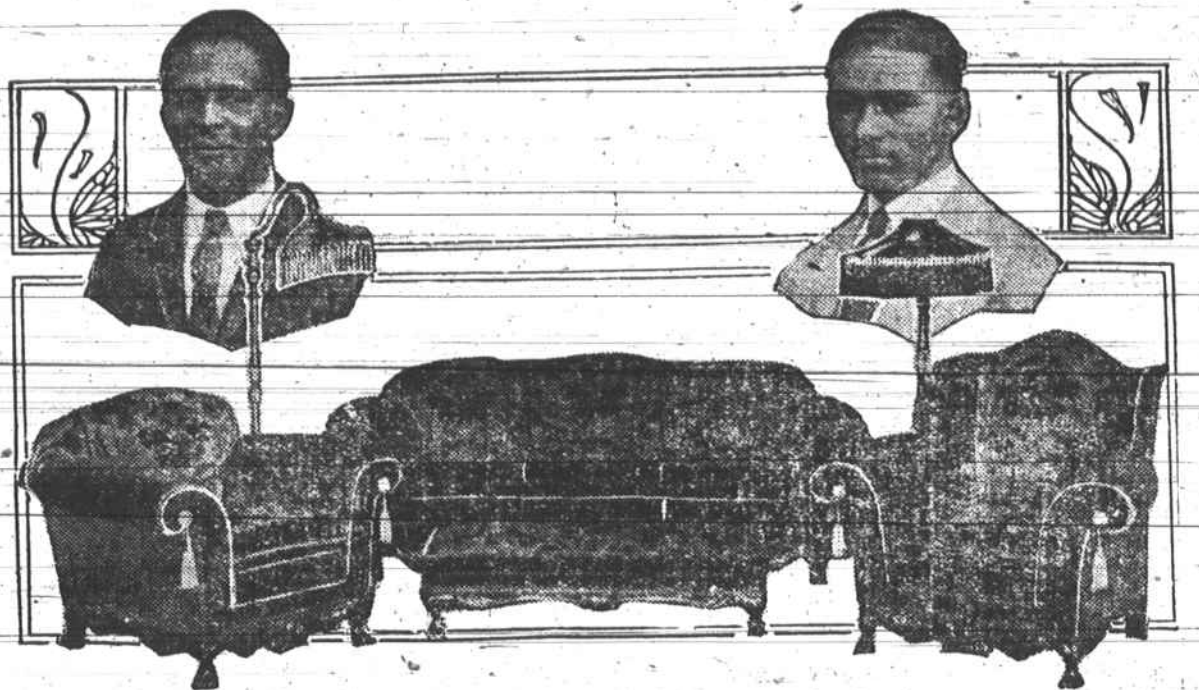

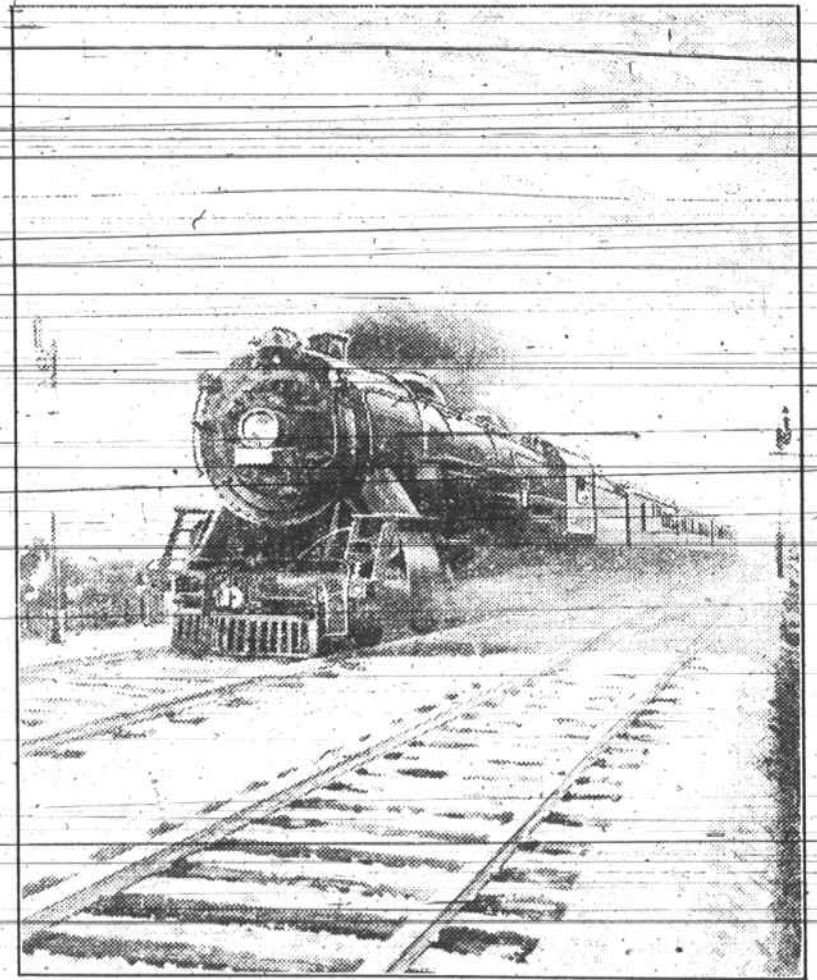
