## Zion's Choir Sings at State Penitentiary.

8:15 a. m., Pastor White had his instrument choir standing before the Guards' Quarters of the State Penitentiary to sing and cheer the prisoners in their sad plight, at their morning services. It was a great sight to behold those hundreds of young white men and colored gathered together in the prison chapel to their morning's vows to God. Dr. J. Dean Crain, the prison chaplain introduced and welcomed the choir and then led in prayer.

Rev. J. C. White called on his choir for an anthem and the choir beautifully chanted "Bless the Lord, O my Soul," which was heartily cheered by the whole prison body. Then the choir sang Jubilees and old plantation melodies, such as: "I Couldn't Hear Nobody Pray," "I want to be a Christian in my Heart," "Long as I can feel the Spirit Moving, etc." Dr. J. D. Crain then gave a brief but one of the most instructive sermons, it has been ours to listen to on the subject of "Salvation and the Final Perseverance of the Saints." Dr. Crain is indeed a great man with a great task, he is affable, practical, deep of thought, and one who can look through you at a glance.

At 11:30 Big Zion was crowded to the doors with anxious hearers. A Rev. Mr. Webber (white preacher) of Indiana and his wife were among those to worship with us. Rev. Mr. Webber accompanied the pastor on the pulpit and led in a fervent prayer. Pastor took his text at Luke 6:6: "There was a man there, whose right hand was withered." From which he preached a most noble sermon, at times the congregation would be fairly standing on their feet. Two happy souls came forward and gave the Pastor their hands, asking for membership.

### Rev. Boyd Builds a New Church. Rev. Bowman Still in Bed. Other News Items.

Winnsboro, Sept. 15.—Rev. Mr. Boyd, who was recently called to the pastorate of the Holiness church here, is doing things on "big orders" and is the talk of the town. He found this church in a dilapidated condition and told his few members he had a vision, and that in ten days this church must be torn down and rebuilt. The members were in accord with the vision, but the church treasurer had the parson to understand that it was "defunct of all funds," but the Parson contended the orders of God must be obeyed, regardless. People of all denominations fell in line, carpenters, day laborers and what not were working on the building; some for half-pay, others just what the church could pay, local lumber dealers sold their lumber and shingles at "close margin; all came soon and worked late and the people of the town wonder, who would finance this work. In a day or two, he took a list and canvassed the town, the white friends, including the banks and other leading white citizens gave nearly three hundred dollars in cold cash, besides many of the colored people furnished nails, labor and other help. In ten days this church was entirely completed in every way; all the carpenters and laborers were satisfactory paid; the lumber deals were all smiling and Sunday gone, both white and colored citizens filled the small church to its utmost capacity, talking about the good work of Brother Boyd.

The Rev. W. R. Bowman, who took seriously ill last week on Washington street in Columbia was brought home yesterday. He said his members at Mill Creek took care of him nicely, white in Columbia. ## Winnsboro Baptists Hold Great Revival.

Last week when I wrote my last letter our meeting at the St. Paul Baptist church, Winnsboro, the services were in their embryo. We had a most profitable revival in which the entire city seemed to have been stirred by the word of God. In the four nights which I preached (Thursday rained us out) 15 happy souls came to the Lord. Backsliders were reclaimed, sinners saved and the church greatly edified. Each night the crowds were more and more. A number of the whites came out each night and did much by way of boosting the meeting. The A. M. E.'s and the Zion Methodists as well as the Presbyterians flocked to each night's service and all took a lively interest in the revival.

The St. Paul Baptist needs nothing but a good God-sent preacher, a man of some education, and one who has good common sense, who will identify himself with those people's interests and he can live like a king. The membership is intelligent, and kind-hearted. Their homes are well kept and they seem to be prosperous.

The Rev. D. W. Rosier, Rev. J. T. Roseboro, F. Gunter and Revs. Boyd were out to assist me each night. Rev. Dr. Rosier and Mr. O. E. Manigault seem to be the two confidants among the white people of Winnsboro and Fairfield county. Two prominent men told me that O. E. Manigault was the most trustworthy colored man in their city.

The Negroes of Winnsboro have one of the best graded school buildings in the course of erection to be found in all of South Carolina, it is an eight spacious roomed building with an auditorium with a capacity of 500 people.

The Rev. D. W. Rosier is the Supervisor of Rural schools for colored. When Dr. Rosier took this work in charge the colored teachers of the county were getting all told only \$4,500; today they are getting \$20,000 besides a large amount has been set aside for building purposes. More Rosenwald schools have been built in Fairfield county than
