APPEAL FILED FOR LOWMANS

Aiken, S. C., Oct. 3.—The pa-
pers in the appeal to the State
supreme court in the case of the
three Lowman Negroes, con-
victed of the killing of Sheriff
Clerk of Court's office in Aiken
yesterday.

N. J. Frederick, colored attor-
ney, of Columbia, is counsel for
the Lowmans, two of whom
were sentenced to the death
penalty and the third, a woman,
given life sentence. The list of
exceptions include the erring of
the Judge in not postponing the
trial to another term because
of the wounded condition of the
defendants, who were shot by
the officers in the fight, and
that the prominence of the
slain man, Sheriff Howard,
caused an excitement in the se-
ction which did not insure the
Lowmans a fair and impartial
trial.

An exception is also made to
the fact that the presiding
Judge did not charge the jury
trying the case that the raiding
officers are compelled to present
a warrant before entering a
house for search, if not in uni-
part form. The case will probably
be heard in Columbia in October.
J. B. Salley and Robt. L. Gun-
ter are assisting Solicitor Berte
D. Carter in the prosecution.—
The Columbia Record.
