CLAFLIN'S FIRST VICTORY HARD FOUGHT BY ST. ATHANASIUS.

Friday October 9, 1925 Claflin opened her 1925 gridiron schedule with a victory. St. Athanasius Academy of Brunswick, Ga., furnished the opposition. The score ended Claflin 18, St. A. 6. The Academy team playing under the handicap of being very much overweighed, put up a spirited fight. In the first half, they practically outplayed Claflin by getting five first downs to Claflin's four and by scoring a touchdown. However Claflin improved in the second half and made practically a l gains in this period. The Panthers offense stiffened to such an extent that St. A. was unable to gain a yard from scrimmage, in the second half. Forward passing played a considerable part of the offense of both teams. Most of St. Athanasius's gain came from this source. Both teams had a large percentage of incomplete passes. In forward passes, end running, and kicking St. A. was approximately on par with Claflin. In the other departments of the game they were outclassed. The Panthers made ten first downs against five for the Saints, and 251 yards against 102 for the Saints.

MOREHOUSE DEFEATS S. C. STATE 22-0.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 14 - The Morehouse College foot ball team of this city defeated the South Carolina State team of Orangeburg, on Morehouse field here Saturday, Oct. 10. In all four of the periods Morehouse showed superior strength, gaining several first downs in the first quarter against none by State.

State offered a stiff resistance in the first half and even though her goal was threatened by Morehouse several times her line tightened and near the end of the half Morehouse had reached her one yard line and there the Tigers lost the ball on downs. As State recovered the ball jumping across the goal line and Morehouse tagging State for a safety. In the second half State launched an areal attack which was effective for gaining but whenever they got deeply into Morehouse territory the Tigers would stop them. In the main time Morehouse earned three touch downs, two through the line and one around the end.
