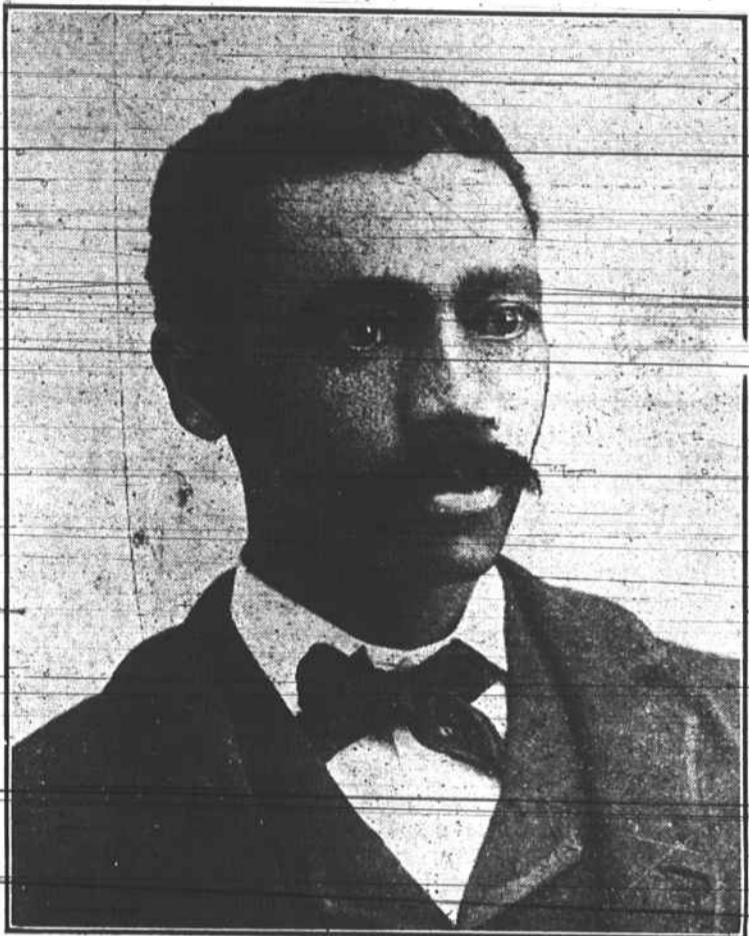


BEN DAVIS SUCCEEDS H. LINCOLN JOHNSON

Street, after an illness of more than six years. Mr. Logan was well known in the state. He was a Master Mason, both in the "Craft" and speculatively. There was hardly a man in the Piedmont who knew more about masonry and practical mechanics than Mr. Logan. He erected two dormitories at Clemson College that stand as a monument to his skill and ingenuity; two cotton mills in Greenwood; Coppin Hall at Allen University; the Waverly Drug Company's building at the corner of Hampton and Harden streets in Columbia and many other handsome buildings and other concrete structures in many parts of South Carolina. Mr. Robert Logan was loved by all and had many friends white and colored in his home town, where he lived for nearly 70 years. He reared one of Greenwood's best and most highly respected families. It is well known to all that the Logans of Greenwood were never beggars though friendly and sympathetic toward everybody they lived on a high plane and commanded the respect of the best people among whom they went.

Among his bereaved relatives are: Rev. and Mrs. M. G. Williams of Greenwood; Mr. & Mrs. I. M. A. Myers of Colum-

bia; Mr. and Mrs. J. Ashby Logan of Cleveland, Ohio. Mrs. Williams and Mrs. Myers are the only daughters and Mr. Ashby Logan his only son. His brother, the Rev. Lucius Logan of Atlanta, three sisters, Mrs. Maude Holloway, Mrs. Maria Davis of Asheville, and Mrs. E. W. Williams of Sumter still survive; also his niece Mrs. Hattie Duckett, directress of the Phyllis Wheatly Center in Greenville. Mr. Logan was an officer of the Mt. Pisgah A. M. E. church for years and was twice a delegate to the General Conference of his church and along with the lamented Paul Jefferson, Bruce Williams and others fought hard for the laymen in church affairs.

The funeral services of the deceased were held in Mt. Pisgah church at Greenwood last Thursday. The eulogy was delivered by Dr. B. J. Ramsey and special talks about the career of the deceased were given by Mr. Ramsey, Blake and Mr. Chas. E. Stuart.

ELECTED NAT. COMMITTEEMAN OF GEORGIA

FREE FROM THE RACE ISSUE

Benjamin J. Davis, Editor and Owner of the "Atlanta Independent," was elected Republican National Committeeman for the State of Georgia

Atlanta, Ga., Oct.—At a meeting altogether free from the race issue and marked by harmony of the most wholesome sort, Benjamin J. Davis, editor and owner of the "Atlanta Independent," was placed in the shoes of the late Henry Lincoln Johnson, by being elected, almost unanimously Republican National Committeeman for the State of Georgia.

Fifty-nine out of sixty members of the Republican State Central Committee were present at the meeting. On the first ballot, Mr. Davis received forty-two votes, by W. H. Harris, Athens, Ga., eight votes, and W. R. Tucker, former assistant United States marshal seven. Mr. Davis received fifteen of the twenty-four white votes. He received the entire Negro vote except that of a Negro who held a white man's proxy.

Just prior to his election, announcement was made of Mr. Davis' indictment on charges preferred by Clark Grier, a disgruntled white man who was Davis' chief opponent for the position. Grier sought either to shove Mr. Davis out of the fight, or to make it impossible to accept the position if elected. The indictment was returned in the home town of Grier and is not regarded as important by those who know the facts in the case.

The election of the "Independent" editor brings to the fore another of Georgia's leading leaders. His career has been one of a willingness to mix it with anybody for principle's sake and by a sanity and conservatism that was oftentimes confusing and maddening to his opponents. He is said to be one of the wealthiest Negroes in Georgia.
