CLAFLIN LOSES BY NARROW MARGIN TO PAINE COLLEGE.

Orangeburg, S. C., Nov. 5—A lone point spelt defeat for Claflin in her annual clash with the gridiron warriors of Paine College. Claflin's failure to make a try for point enabled Paine to emerge from the conflict a one point victor. The final count was Claflin 6, Paine College 7.

The Claflinites outplayed the visitors on the offense but the superior punting of Paine and some completed passes helped Paine to stave off a defeat, that was impending several times during the first three quarters and part of the fourth quarter.

Claflin wasted no fewer than three golden opportunities for scoring. 12 first downs were made by Claflin and 6 by Paine. 254 yards from scrimmage were gained by Claflin against 114 yards by Paine. Claflin complete 2 passes out of 16 attempts; Paine completed 5 out 13 attempts. Paine intercepted 3 passes and Claflin intercepted 2. Claflin averaged 26 yards out of 11 punts, Paine averaged 34 yards out of 11 punts.
