Carr of the Asheville Enterprise addressed an attentive audience of Columbians at Zion Baptist church just before baptism. Editor Carr was introduced by Dr. White, as one of his best friends on earth. Dr. White told Columbians that when he is in Asheville no night is too dark, no journey to rough and long but that Mr. Carr will not undertake it for his (Dr. White's) comfort.

At the evening service Pastor Adams preached from St. Luke 10th chapter, the latter clause of the 17th verse: "What shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?" Emphasizing the importance of the question. The collection for the day was very good. The captains of the several counties are still forging ahead with the rally. The services throughout the entire day, with the splendid music that the choir always renders, were uplifting and inspiring.

Mr. Carr came to the platform and said: "I am here to put Asheville in a more favorable light with the people of South Carolina. He told of recent near-riot, and the apprehension of the two culprits and their trials, which he deemed was fair and impartial. He told of the good will that existed between the whites and blacks of the "Land of the Sky," and pleaded with South Carolinians to pay no attention to false reports about Asheville. Mr. Carr's speech was very highly received by the big audience. Mr. Carr is the guest of Allen University and Mrs. L. J. Rhodes, proprietress of the Good Samaritan Hospital.
