Thompson. The pastor presented Dr. R. W. Mance, former president of Allen University, who read the Scripture lesson, (the 90th Psalms). Rev. Adams with a few brief remarks introduced Dr. M. H. Davis, of Baltimore, Md., who preached from the 90th Psalms and the 12th verse: "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom." A strong ap-

peal, so earnestly made to take Christ into your life, if you would apply your heart to wisdom. After extending the invitation to join, Pastor Adams, presented Dr. R. W. Mance, who in turn with such smooth and applicable terms, as is his custom, introduced Bishop R. C. Ransom, of New York City, presiding bishop of the 14th Episcopal District, who thrilled the audience for a short while with his eloquence, asserting that "The Christian Church is faced to day with a great challenge. There is hope in America for the Negro. The race has a great opportunity to be of great service to God, declared the Bishop. Men have discovered that acts of Congress and legislatures will not perpetuate our civilization. The church of Jesus Christ is the most potent force. The ministers and Christian leaders are in a position to do more than the man who goes to Congress. The consciences of the people must be awakened through the spiritual life." To say the least the evening was a treat to all present.
