Orangeburg, S. C., Nov. 29—On Turkey Day Claflin traveled to Columbia, S. C. to meet Benedict College for their annual affray and despite the terrific driving power the Claflin aggregation was held scoreless while Benedict with a field goal made a tally for three.

Claflin's best chance to score came early in the first quarter when "Big Tiller" Claflin's fast end went down on a punt and recovered the ball within 35 yards of goal after it had been touched by the Benedict safety man. Here Claflin began a drive which carried the ball to the 20 yard line and on the first down attempted a pass which was incomplete in the end zone causing the ball to go to Benedict on the 20 yard line. At the very end of this period Benedict after several unsuccessful attempts to gain thru the line kicked a field goal which was the only score made in the game. The half ended with the ball in Claflin's possession.

### HUGE CROWD SEES FIGHT

Practically the entire adult population of colored North Carolina was in Greensboro on Thanksgiving Day to witness the hectic thrilling classic. With out a doubt, the greatest crowd ever in attendance at a football game played between Negro teams in N. C. was present to witness the Turkey Day struggle, played at Cone Park between two well trained, hard fighting teams, representing Shaw University and A. & T. College. In the first half, the Greensboro boys were outclassed by the visitors, the ball being played most of the time in A. & T.'s territory. The sharp attack of Shaw was gallantly led by the fiery quarter, George Mitchell and his fellow comrades, Martin and Chambers.

In the third quarter, at the kickoff, the ball went over the goal line. A. & T., for some reason forgot and refused to fall on the ball. Shaw was taking advantage of this disadvantage of A. & T., fell on the ball and was awarded the first touchdown of the game. By the way of a placement kick contributed by the educated toe of Chambers, Shaw added another point, giving her a lead of 7-0.

Up to this period, A. & T. had shown nothing in attacking strength. Virtually every attack, every drive was stopped dead by the slashing defensive play of Shaw's line led by Capt. Gill. With their backs against the wall, the A. & T. magnificent foot ball machine came back strong, displayed a charging attack that netted them seven points. Several times, the heady quarter Bell deceived the two officials, the entire Shaw team and all of the spectators. Bus Coleman, the fleet footed gridder, carried the ball over for A. & T.'s touchdown. Lining up on

the three yard line, Lane carried the ball over for the extra point, thus bringing joy to the followers of A. & T. College by evening the score. From then on, A. & T. out classed Shaw in all departments of the game. Capt. Wilson, because of a dislocated shoulder blade was removed from the game in the first half. Milner took his place.

Was there a crowd? There was some crowd from the gate-keeper's point of view. Receipts unofficially are said to have exceeded \$5,000 for the day. Never could so many people be assembled with less friction, less disorder, less ill temper. Coaches Byam and Martin should be proud of their boys. Coleman for A. & T. and Chambers for Shaw gave some exhibitions in punting—both about on even basis.

When the whistle blew, marking the end of the game, several of the Shaw men ended their services for their Alma Mater. Included in this number is George Mitchell, fiery quarter back who on many occasions has brought Shaw on the gridiron. It is said that Mitchell is a clean sport. This is a great credit to any athlete and a rich lesson for all players. Here's luck to George Mitchell.
