Orangeburg, S. C.—The State Association of Negro Teachers of South Carolina which convenes at Columbia March 18-19-20, will be without a precedent. Of course that is expected; for we count ourselves as being progressive, and progressiveness means bettering our conditions from year to year. These three days will be brimming full of information-giving and information-receiving because those who are amply prepared to impart will be present, as well as those who are able and anxious to take in. The meeting opens properly with a welcome by Mayor Coleman, featuring the three days' program are lectures by Dr. H. A. Morgan, University of Tennessee; Mr. J. B. Felton, State Agent of Negro Schools; Hon. James H. Hope, State Superintendent of Public Instruction for South Carolina and Dr. R. S. Wilkinson, President of State College for Negroes in South Carolina. President Wilkinson will talk on "Educational Progress of Negroes in South Carolina." Of no lesser importance will be the address of the Miss Mary McSkimmon, President of the National Education Association.
It is hoped that every teacher of the State will register at this meeting. None can attend without a chance at full benefit for having gone. Every phase of education will be dealt with by experts in both public meetings and smaller group meetings. Benedict College and Allen University will be the hosts to the teachers of the State. All are conscious of the fact that a royal entertainment awaits them.
