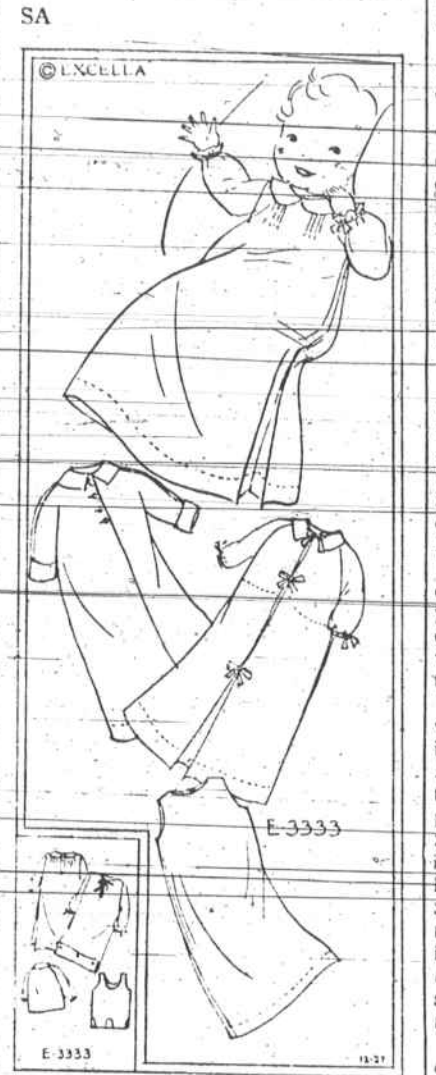
EDGEFIELD NEWS
