1. Make out a quarterly or yearly budget and list the objectives you want to support. They ought include supplies, missions, representation, leadership training and education.
2. Have class contests for banner attendance.
3. Department contests.
4. Contests for Finance Banner.
5. Contests for Service Banner.
6. Assign each class and department a certain amount of money to be raised.
7. Let each class and department

ment work their own plans secretly.
8. Feed and Fun Socials for classes, departments and the whole school or union.
9. Have home, community and invited talent programs.
10. Have individual workers who will give and get others to give.
11. Observe days and monthly projects.
12. Tithing.
13. Stewardship Training.
14. The church to finance all the organizations in it out of its regular funds. Let all the organizations turn over all money they raise into the church funds and have only one treasurer. As the organizations have need they draw from the church funds. (This is the best way).
Selling to get money is approved provided you do not cheat and defraud. The church has not the right to charge 10c for 5c worth of food. I do not approve of selling and begging to get money to operate the church or its organizations.
