#### House Group Sponsors Bill for Negro Law School in S. C.

JUDICIARY BODY VOTES 22 TO 0 FOR MEASURE

The house judiciary co Wednesday voted 22 to 0, to sponsor a bill to set up a school of law at the state Negro college South Carolina A. and M., Orangeburg, to meet what a trustee termed a critical situation at the Univer-

sity of South Carolina.

House Speaker Sol Blatt, chairman of a subcommittee of university trustees, urged immediate action by the judiciary committee in its special session, explaining that the trustees expected an effort within a few days to force the university to allow a Negro to be admitted to the law school at the beginning of the second se-

mester February 13.

A Negro, a resident of Columbia, applied for entrance at the law school a year ago and the ap plication was promptly referred to the subcommittee.

Under the United States supreme court's recent decision requiring Missouri to furnish equal educational opportunities for Ne-grees and whites, Blatt said, "We know of no other way to meet this than to establish a chair of

law at the state Negro college."

"I say this with all due deference to you gentlemen that Negroes do pay taxes" and therefore are entitled to consideration," he Blatt, a Barnwell attorney, said

the Association for the Advance-ment for Colored People, with offices at New York, was sponsor-ing the law school applicant.
