A Sunday school rally ev. ery ninety days will keep your treasure bubbling over with cash and you will be able to turn over some money to the general church for its expenses.

There are missionaries that will visit the various schools and lec ture and instruct them from pass experience as Sunday school work ers, each visit should be proceed ed with an official notice to the school by the visitor, and then a hearty welcome is usually expect-


