After making a few comments on the occasion which marked the birthday of Florence Nightingale, arch angel of nurses, the Union Coun-ty Senator said: "Hospitals arc no longer institutions for the se lected few as in days of old but are institutions which serve ev-erybody". He added that these in stitutions have become very esof all Ameri cans, and that Union county is blessed to have a hapital which is owned and controlled by Negroes After pledging his support of and cooperation with the authorities of the Community hospital, he declared that the institution deserved the support of every colored person also, in the county.

Others who appeared on the program were: Professor A. A. Sims chairman of the hospital's board; Mrs. Mamye Wilson, president of the Women's auxiliary; the Rev. A. D. Duncan, Sr., and Claude Wilson, assistant-manager of the Spartanburg District, North Carolina Mutual Life Ins. Co.
