"Have you asked your city govinment to investigate all meetng places in your city Asked hata similar death-traps be clean d up . . . and, of more impor-ance, perhaps, opened so that here are several means for rapd exit, rather than a lone exit hich can become blocked with ampled, mangled bodies?

"All doors on all public gatherng places should open outwards chool houses, churches, etc. ance and exit.

"Eliminate chance for repetion of such disasters in your own mmunity by informing your city overnment that you expect it to ake steps to "clean up" and open up" the places where Neoes gather to work or to play.
