First Class of Colored Aviation Cadets Begins Training On Saturday, July 19th

Ten young colored meen who have qualified as aviation cadets

in the United State, Army will begin training at Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama, on July 19, 1941, as pilots for the 99th Pursuit Squadron, first tactical unit in the Army Air Forces composed of colored soldiers, the War Dcpartment announced today. The ten men constitute the first $clas_{s}$ in this project. Although the quota of pilots for the squadron is about 33, a total of about 100 colorod aviation cadets will trained annually. cadets by the Air Corps, the ten men have had 2 years' college education or have shown in tests they have the equivalent. They have also met the rigorous physical requirements of the Air Corps.

These aviation cadets will re-ceive five weeks of pre-flight training, including basic military instruction and mathematics. Then, on August 23rd, they will begin their 10-week course of primary Training. These fifteen weeks of instruction will be conducted at Tuskegee Institute, which has been awarded an \$80,000 contract for this purpose.

When this phase of the training is completed the men will take a 10-week course in basic and a 10week course in advanced training in a school operated b" the Army Air Corps, at Chehaw, 4 miles

from Tuskegee. When this first class of aviation cadets begins its primary training on August 23rd, a second class will begin its pre-flight training. By October 4 three classes will be in session and that number will maintained continuously.
