'DINING OUT' AT HOME

—always hits the spot. The "Blue Plate Special," which is featured on many restaurant bills-of-fare, can be duplicated by the home hostess who wishes to avoid all last-minute serving. Any large dinner plate may be used, or there are jolly little fibre insert plates which fit onto an underlying tin tray, which are even better since they do away with all dishwashing. You may buy the tin tray for a small sum, and purchase the fibre inserts as required. These are divided into four spaces or partitions, one for a salad, one for the sandwich, and the other for relish or dessert. These trays "stay put" on the lap, and are quite agreeable to use.

In this home "Blue Plate" arrangement in advance a substantial salad made of crab-meat, salmon, or egg, for example, include a fritter if you like or shoestring potatoes which can even be purchased in cans, and then serve berries or fruit aspic in a paper frill—so that, after the meal is enjoyed, the plate, too, may "disappear" in a flash, leaving the hostess free to enjoy her husband or guests, with no bugaboo of the kitchen sink to haunt her.

Then there's that fine hot sandwich meal for the man who simply must have a hot dish, or he thinks it's not a meal at all. Take any sliced meat you prefer—roast beef is tops, also roast lamb or ham slice—have it precooked, and ready to "heat up," whenever needed. Keep on hand a fine, well-made gravy.

Then, there are kidneys which can be "deviled" in advance and left to heat in a jiffy when the toast is ready; or shrimp in a cream sauce or minced beef liver, or diced chicken veal and other familiar items. Skillless frankfurters, too, taste very snappy when cooked and then sliced in rings and used as a hot sandwich mixture. Or use thinly sliced liver sausage and saute in butter until a delicate brown. Have a small can of baked beans separately heated. Make 2 slices of toast. Serve the sausage on the toast garnish with hot beans, and pass catsup and pickles.

Since canned tomato juice is used so frequently in cocktail form, with these light Summer suppers, here are a few novel ways to give new flavor to your familiar canned tomato juice:

- 1—Add dash of black walnut catsup, salt, and black pepper.
- 2—Add dash of onion salt, celery salt, and Worcestershire.
- 3—Add dash of powdered thyme, celery salt, onion salt and Tabasco.

- 4—Add lime juice and a dash of bitters.
 - 5—Add dash of bottled soy sauce and shavings of garlic.
- And here's a couple of last-minute variations on Summer drinks which can be added to the plate meal, making it both nourishing and refreshing:
- Plantation Milkshake: Combine 1-4 cup peanut butter, 1-4 cup sugar and dash of salt with 1-4 cup milk, and whip with rotary beater until smooth. Add 1 3-4 cups additional milk and beat until blended. Add 1-4 teaspoon vanilla. Pour over cracked ice.

President Samuel R. Higgins of Allen University, announced recently that the library commission had decided to begin work on the library building within the next few days. This was decided upon after President Higgins had had a conference with Bishop Joseph S. Flanner, head of the A. M. E. Church in South Carolina, who is anxious that the building be dedicated and put into use as quickly as possible.

President Higgins said that the work will go forward without interruption until the building is completed. The building is to cost approximately \$35,000.

The United Service Organization is to place a building on the property of Allen University at the corner of Taylor and Oak streets, adjacent to Hurst Athletic Field and the President's home. This building is to be used as a recreational center for Negro soldiers. It is to be the property of Allen University after the emergency. The arrangement with the USO

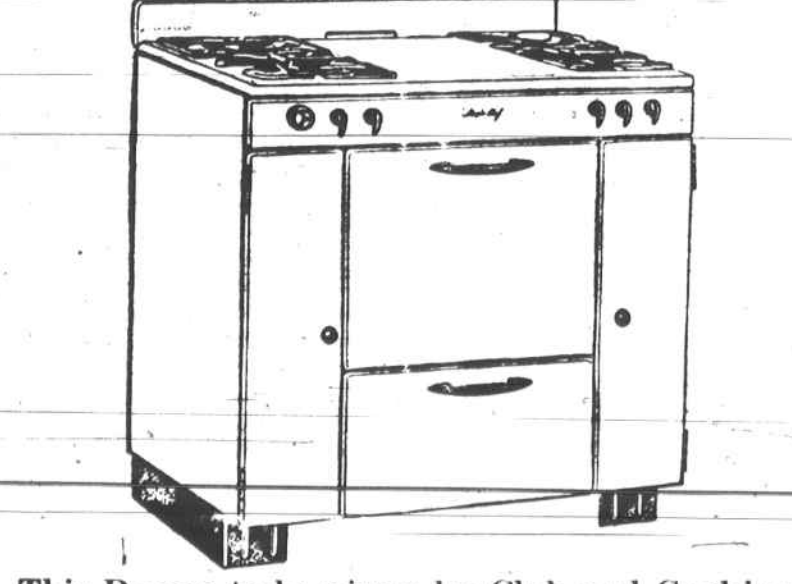
