SECOND BOND SALE DRIVE OFF TO FAIR START



The second bond sale drive got off to a fair start among Negroes in this community when the local Negro committee along with forty other leaders met in the Allen University auditorium.

The meeting was opened with short talks by W. H. Harvey, the chairman of the committee, and Mrs. M. M. Simkins. Both speakers spoke of the necessity of purchasing bonds and stamps during this second bond drive.

James M. Hinton, manager of the Pilgrim Life Insurance Company in this state and W. H. Har-

tney, manager of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company in this district are requiring all their agents to spend a part of their time on the field attempting to place war bonds in every home where the agent makes collections. Other individuals present who represented organizations whose group purchase would be encouraged were President Higgins of Allen University, Mrs. J. Stark of Benedict College, and T. J. Miles, Director of playground

activities among the Colored people in Columbia.

The persons present came prepared to start the drive by making their personal purchases at this first meeting. Dean G. E. Nelson, secretary of the committee, stated that the fifty-three persons present bought—and he has already delivered to them—\$11,550 worth of bonds.

Several hundred dollars have been reported since the initial meeting.

PALMETTO MEDICAL, DENTAL AND PHARMACEUTICAL ASSO'N. HOLDS EPOCHAL SESSION HERE

Columbia, S. C., April 23, 1943—An epochal three days session of the Palmetto Medical, Dental and Pharmaceutical association came to a close here Friday in what was described by officials as the most profitable and instructive session of 47 years existence of the association.

The Medical and Dental Clinics conducted this year were declared the best since they were established seven years ago.

The three day sessions were highlighted by an address on "Definition and Care of The Skin" at the public session Wednesday night by Dr. Ralph Scull, noted dermatologist, Chicago, and by scientific presentations at the scientific sessions held by the medical section at Allen University and by the dental section at Benedict college.

Doctors attending the sessions from all parts of South Carolina and adjoining states spent the major portion of their time at the clinics where able surgeons and dentists performed major operations.

Madison, D.M.S., M.Sc., Assistant Professor of Dentistry, Howard Dental college, Clifton; O. Dummett, A.B., D.D.S., M.D.S., Head of the Department of Periodontology, Meharry Dental College, Nashville; and C. L. Cooper, Ph. Essysit, Head of the Department of Pharmacy, Howard Medical school, Washington.
