Miss Vivian Hentz left for Philadelphia to enter school, after spending two months with her mother, Mrs. N. A. Rice.

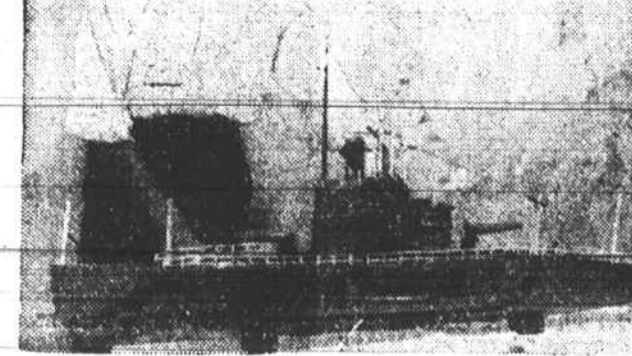
Dr. E. B. Bowling a prominent physician of the 2nd Episcopal District, returned to Irmo, S. C. He delivered a wonderful sermon.
