WASHINGTON (ANP)—Assistant Secretary of Labor J. Ernest Wilkins made history last week when he became the first Negro ever to attend officially a cabinet meeting with the President of the United States.

Wilkins represented his department at this important White House cabinet conference in the absence of Labor Secretary Mitchell, who was out of the city on a speaking engagement.

In commenting on their experience, Wilkins said it was both interesting and challenging: "I was particularly impressed with the way our great President handled every item on the agenda."
