Cherished remarks were made with beautiful cure by Bishop Hatcher who said, "Bishop Fountain is a gift from above." Bishop Reid of South Carolina said, "I likened him unto a river with power. There comes a reverence in that he belongs to the ages. I hold great admiration for the man himself, because of what he has done to others." Bishop Allen said, "His missionary activities are great and powerful, likewise, his sermons, and his addresses. Bishop Allen quoted the New York Times: 'A great Bishop has fallen: The Bishop Emeritus of African Methodism, with honor he has merited.' Dr. J. R. Hurley, who held his hand in the hour of his passing, said, "He was above the ordinary. He kept the common touch. I remember him as a great General under trials, and in varied unique experiences. Among the numerous Chaplains Bishop Fountain gave the Army, I'm included. 'Dr. H. I. Bearden said, "He was a maker of men. I loved him. He loved me. He was a man of high integrity who loved his church, family and his fellowman. Mrs. Fountain was endearingly named by him as 'Sweet heart.' Dr. O. Sherman of Arkansas paid a glowing tribute to Mrs. Fountain, and gave briefs on the high mark he made in Arkansas while presiding there. Rev. M. L. King of Ebenezer Baptist, Atlanta, said, "He was the best friend I ever had. I saw him lose himself for Morris Brown. Dr. King quoted Bishop Greene's compliment to Bishop Fountain during an occasional assembly. "This has been done in Georgia a long time." Bishop Fountain made it possible," Dr. E. A. Selby spoke for the Board of General Officers, adding a personal word for himself, "Bishop Fountain was my spiritual Father, 'Lest we forget his loyalty to the Sunday School Union." He was quite too tinged emotionally to speak other than briefly. Dr. Charles Hill said, "Bishop Fountain was an illustrious man of the church, whose faithfully life pleased the Son of God. His virtues of better living were his quest of truth. He followed it so, that he saw while plowing in the field." Dr. G. W. Blakely represented Bishop D. O. Walker of the 5th District, Dr. John H. Lewis of Morris Brown College said, "He saw the goal ahead for Christian Education. He built for tomorrow and times to come." Other distinguished representatives were Dr. R. A. Billings for the Connectional Laymen, Dr. Rufus F. Clement, president of Atlanta University disclosed the contribution of Bishop Fountain as a member of the Trustee Board there. Bishop J. W. E. Bowen of the Methodist Church, Bishop W. E. Fuller of the Holiness Church, all told of the high degree of dignity of the deceased. The main body of the program preceding the eulogies gave splendor, pronouncement, and proper setting for the speakers. Bishop S. L. Greene presided, Bishop P. W. Nichols lined the first hymn. Prayer was offered by Bishop I. H. Bonner, First Scripture by Bishop C. A. Gibbs, second Scripture by Bishop Joseph Gomez, alternate by Dr. C. L. Hill. Obituary was given by Dr. D. H. Stanton of the American Bible Society, long time friend, Bishop H. T. Primm gave the consoling benediction. Bishop G. W. Baber, the Commitment: The long processional turned its way toward the cemetery to lay to rest our jewel. Our Friends already there to wit were: Turner, Flipper and other saints. I imagine the meeting over there was a pleasant occasion. Rising to appropriate need of this hour was Bishop G. W. Baber, and the others of the Bench. Afterwards to cheer the sorrowing of so many who wept a sorrowing tear just from remembering that we would miss so gracious a father, the General officers were escorted to the spot under an old tree that marked the place where the re-

main of the late Turner lay in rest. It was then that I felt the challenge the same as did Singleton, Morris, Clark, Mance, Selby, Bearden, Brown and others the great need to join the crusade to erect a monument to Bishop Turner where that tree limbs only mark his wind-swept grave. With honest pride the warmest hospitality was extended all the visitors by Bishop and Mrs. Greene, Revs. J. T. Davis, H. C. Carswell, J. F. Moses, E. J. Odom, Jr., Cunningham, Jiles, Hurley, and others and their wives of the South's greatest social center, Atlanta. Continued from page 1. Some of the buildings are unsafe. The bond issue money will be used to make them safe, to provide more facilities so the hospital can be of greater service to all the people of the county. Did you know that the Columbia hospital employs more people than all but a few industries in the county. The average number of employees this year will be about 700. And colored people are employed in 341 of those 700 positions. Of all the people-students, graduate nurses and other eligible to live in the nurses' home—last year, 100 were colored and 226 were white. New equipment will be installed in the Negro unit and it will be modernized in many other respects, including the installation of an additional elevator, modern beds and furniture. The delivery rooms, and operating and obstetrical sections will be air conditioned. An additional floor will be added to the Negro nurses' home, and it will be modernized and renovated. New furnishings will be installed. The hospital's board of trustees selected the most important improvements for inclusion in the building program. As soon as more money is available, many other improvements are planned.
