If you are wondering on Sunday morning as to where you would like to serve the Lord, come to Taylor Chapel, you are always welcome.

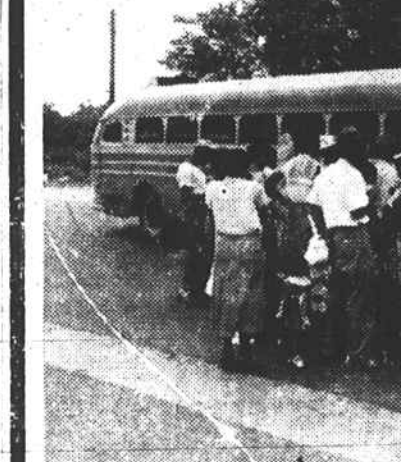
