S. C. Born Pastor Promoted In Connecticut

OLD MYSTIC, Conn.—The Negro pastor of an all-white congregation was promoted last week.

The Rev. Simon Peter Montgomery, 35 transferred to another Methodist congregation in Rockville, about three times as large and paying more money, commented:

"My only aim is to serve and do the will of God."

The approximate figures for the congregations are 90 in Old Mystic, 275 in Rockville. The Rev. Mr. Montgomery is chaplain of the lower house of the state legislature.

He's originally from Pineville, S. C.

On May 26 the conference of the Rockville church asked Bishop John Wesley Lord if the Rev. Montgomery could be appointed there. The conference chose him rather than several other candidates, all white.

The assignment was announced this week.

The Rev. Mr. Montgomery said he had been very happy in Old Mystic, and he considered the new appointment a real opportunity. He said he understood there a Cape Cod cottage, newly renovated, for the parsonage; and a \$40,000 building program going on.

The Rev. Mr. Montgomery came to Old Mystic less than two years ago. A year ago he became full-time pastor, and since then the congregation has doubled and a \$75,000 building program has been completed.

Tuskegee Negroes May Boycott City Business

TUSKEGEE, Ala., Negroes of Tuskegee were urged Tuesday to boycott merchants who are not their friends in retaliation for a legislative act to exclude Negroes from the city.

A packed hymn-singing crowd in a small Negro church was told by the president of a Negro civic group that it should "not feed those who would devour us."

The meeting was reminiscent of another church meeting a year and a half ago that launched the yearlong Negro boycott of segregated city busses in Montgomery, Ala., 40 miles away.

Child Struck By Automobile

McCORMICK—A three year old girl from McCormick County was listed in critical condition at Brewer Hospital in Greenwood after being hit by an automobile near here last Thursday night.

Patrolman B. C. Tuttle of the Highway Patrol identified the girl as Carolyn Jenning.

The child was hit by a 1953 Pontiac, driven by Glenn R. Wolfe, 37, of Abbeville. Patrolman Tuttle said, Wolfe told the patrolman the child darted in front of the car from the right side of the road at her grandparent's house on Secondary Road 33-23.

Wolfe was traveling north and was about nine miles east of McCormick when the accident occurred about 6 p.m.

The child was hit by the front center of the car and knocked about 67 feet, the patrolman reported.

Wolfe took the child to the Greenwood hospital where she was listed in critical condition with head and other injuries.

Patrolman Tuttle said no charges had been filed.
