## THE NEGRO POTENTIAL

By Eli Ginzberg, with the assistance of James K. Anderson, Douglas W. Bray, and Robert W. Smuts

Published by Columbia University Press; Price \$3.00

A comprehensive interpretation of the major changes in the education of the Negro population since the turn of the century, this book relates their educational preparation to the recent growth of job opportunities and shows what must be done before Negroes can take full advantage of these new opportunities. The more effective utilization of Negro manpower is illustrated by a detailed consideration, based upon hitherto unavailable data, of the integration of the Negro soldier. The concluding chapter considers the implications of this study for manpower policies aimed at raising the productivity of similar groups that are suffering from discrimination. Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell says that "this book will be of great value as we work out constructive solutions to a major challenge facing American democracy."

Dr. Ginzberg, Professor of Economics at Columbia University, is Director of the Conservation of Human Resources Project, Columbia University. Mr. Anderson, Dr. Eray, and Mr. Smuts are Research Associates of the Project.

## RAGE ON THE BAR

By Geoffrey Wagner

Set in a decadent island paradise, this swiftly-paced novel explores the conflicting loyalties of a world in transition. Within mounting tension, Geoffrey Wagner recounts the events growing out of the insane efforts of a colonial past to maintain its privileges against the present drive of a native people to govern themselves.

Philip Teale, newly-arrived A. D. C. to the Governor General of Connaught, in the Caribbean, soon learns that island affairs are in the hands of the powerful Diehl family. He, himself, is not unwilling to be in the hands of Lady Leone, most fascinating of the Diehls, who alternately encourages and repels Teale's advances. Most important of all, Teale discovers a native rebellion stirring, and is torn between his natural sympathies for the mistreated Negro population and his duty as an Army man.

Mr. Wagner gives us incisive, satiric portraits of the worst of the colonials; he writes with exact poetry of the landscape of sea and island; but primarily he tells a story that winds tighter and tighter toward its violent final chapters, as it illuminates one of the central problems of the modern world.

Novelist, critic, and poet, Geoffrey Wagner was born in Malaya and educated at Christ Church, Ox-

ford, and at Columbia University. He contributes frequently to leading literary journals here and abroad, gives a regular book talk over WNYC, and teaches in the English Department at the City College of New York. His other novels include Venables and The Dispossessed.

For the thousands who find themselves perplexed and frustrated by the problems and pressures of life today, Anthony Norvell has words of hope and courage drawn from his long experience as an adviser in human relations. In every human psyche, Mr. Norvell has found, there are three fundamental needs: the need for the sense of security (financial, emotional, and spiritual); the need for success in its true meaning of fulfillment of one's potentialities; and the need to oneself and to others. In learning how to satisfy these needs we learn how to control our destiny—instead of letting ourselves be controlled by circumstances.

In this inspiring book, rich in examples of people both famous and obscure who have triumphed over adversity and their own perplexity, Mr. Norvell shows how the reader can win his way to the deepest satisfactions of life. With keen insight he teaches the reader how to overcome the fear and anxiety that are the enemies of self-fulfillment, how to build the confidence and will power that lead to success, and how to find the friendship and love with which no life can be complete. "How to control Your Destiny," reflecting the author's deep knowledge and faith in human nature will give each reader a new knowledge and faith in himself.
