STAN RAY LIGHT ON THEATRE-TV

There went on last night the first show for the Carolina Theater audience of the World Championship of the Carolina Theater television fight between boxer Ray Robinson and former baseball player Jimmie Foxx at Yankee Stadium Monday night. Spectators paid \$10.00 each for the match.

It was the first time that Robinson had been in the South Carolinian—had had a live TV screen theatre teablast of a fight. Since there will be no public television showing of the match, it is expected that the spectators will be limited to 1000 persons. Robinson is expected to be the most popular fighter to see the match.

The last "World Warne" Glorie Purvis said 1000 seats will be reserved and the rest of the capacity of the theater will be sold.

All seats sell at the same price—\$1.00, including tax.

In case of postponement, the fight will be rescheduled the following night (Sun., 24).

One of the largest fight crowds of the year is expected to be on hand at Yankee Stadium for the opening round.

Robinson, the aging champion, is a slight 6'6, featherweight as he prepares for the 15th bout of his colorful career. His overall record is 140 victories, 91 knockouts, two losses and five draws.

Basilio, 20, one of the most aggressive fighters around today, has a record of 51 victories, 12 losses and seven draws. He knocked out 24 of his opponents.
