 Only meager details are obtainable at this time of the killing of Sam Dixon last Thursday by Ed. Campbell.
 It is known that on last Thursday these two young men, while more or less under the influence of drink had a fight on the public highway in the lower part of the County. Campbell struck Dixon on the head with a heavy stick, knocking him down. Dixon arose and started across a field and Campbell moved on.
 Only two small boys saw the fight and nothing was thought of it until Sunday, when the continued absence of Dixon from his familiar haunts was noted. A search was made and he was found lying face downward in the field he had started to cross on Thursday. He had apparently died soon after falling.
 Campbell was arrested by Constable C.L. Melton and lodged in jail.
