

game cock," are steadily and surely pushing forward their road to completion.

All around us we see the march of improvement—our neighbors "Going ahead." And what are we doing? Let us spread before us a map of North and South Carolina; draw the Rail Road from Columbia through Winnsboro, Chester, and across the river to Charlotte; draw the Fayetteville Plank Road through Carthage, to the point where it spreads into two; draw the western branch through Randolph and Davidson to Lexington, through Rowan to Salisbury, and almost to a certainty, from thence to Concord and Charlotte; draw the Plank Road from Cheraw through Chesterfield into that richest cotton producing County of N. C., (we mean Anson) and are in all probability, through Union to Mecklenburg; then draw the Manchester Rail Road through Sumterville near Darlington, through Marion to Wilmington, and the picture is complete. We entreat you to study it well, and do not lay the "flatteringunction to your souls," that these Roads will not be built. They will be built, mark it! just so sure as that our Branch Rail Road was built, despite the wise shakings of the head, and sneers of those who fancied that they would be injured by it. Just so sure will this cord of Rail and Plank Roads be built around us, and our neighbors reap the rich harvest in store, for those who will go forth to gather it. The "Philistines" are upon us, and unless we go forth and shake ourselves, we will be shorn of our strength. Are you not convinced by the look at your map? Do you not see the necessity of a speedy effort?

Look then with us at the map once more; draw a line from Charlotte to Charleston, our commercial emporium,—Camden and Lancaster are almost immediately upon it—and it follows as a matter of course, that if we establish social and commercial facilities equal to the exigence of the times, this line of communication must take precedence of others. Charlotte is at present in communication with Charleston by a Tri-weekly Line, requiring about fifty-seven hours to accomplish the journey. Freight is conveyed by a still slower process, requiring at least a week for the trip. Let us then, firstly and immediately, have a daily line of Stages running in connection with our Rail Road, and lessening the time between the two points more than one half, the journey can be accomplished in this way easily in 23 to 24 hours. This is clearly our right, and we believe we have only to ask for it to obtain it. What say you Lancaster and Mecklenburg, will you not at once unite with us in getting up a monster petition to the Post Master General for this object. We suggest that a public meeting be held at the Court houses of Kershaw, Lancaster, and Mecklenburg, on next Sale day, (first Monday in June) and after appropriate resolutions are adopted, and a suitable memorial prepared, a committee be appointed to procure signatures to the same in time, to be forwarded to the Department by the 15th June, that the action of the Post Master General may be had by the commencement of the next Post Office Quarter, say 1st July. Are you not all agreed, then let us "Go Ahead."

Secondly and immediately also, let us cease talking, and without waiting for a charter, set to work and build a Plank Road to the North Carolina line, the right of way will be cheerfully accorded. We feel, we know it is not only vitally important to our prosperity, but absolutely necessary for our preservation. We can if we will. We have the means. We are right, let us "Go Ahead."

**Abandoned.**  
We learn by the New Orleans and Savannah papers that the expeditions which were supposed to have been fitting out against Cuba have been abandoned, at least so far as those cities are concerned, and the leaders returned to their homes. Glad to hear it—it will doubtless relieve President Fillmore of a great deal of uneasiness, and as his friend, the "Captain General" will have no need for his tender solicitude for the present, perhaps he may turn his attention to our own citizens, and offer some protection to the people of Texas against the depredations of the Indians.

**Snow Storm.**  
There was a violent snow storm at the North on Monday last. In western Maryland the snow was 5 inches, and in some portions of Pennsylvania 18 inches deep.

The rumor is current in our exchanges that the Hon. Josiah J. Evans intends resigning the office of Judge at the next session of the Legislature.

**Steam Boat Burnt.**  
The steamer Webster, bound to New Orleans from Cincinnati, caught fire on Friday last, about one hundred miles above Vicksburg, and was entirely consumed. Thirty or forty persons, including the captain and his wife, and the two clerks were burned, or drowned in attempting to escape from the flames.

**Southern Abolitionists.**—There is a class of men at the South, who, ranging themselves under the banner of the Union under all circumstances, are doing more to effect the abolition of slavery than the fanatics of the North. These characters are really and truly abolitionists, and ought to be called the Southern abolitionist party. The reason is plain. The abolition party at the North is now powerful and formidable. They set out with the avowed and sworn purposes to effect the extinction of slavery. The party has been growing ever since the year 1818, is growing now, and will continue to grow. It is composed of materials, reckless, wild, and enthusiastic, that will not be foiled or discouraged. They have sworn to succeed. Their numbers are increasing. Their influence is becoming a matter of importance to the Government. Constant dropping will wear away a stone. Unwearied and unremitting exertions will overcome all obstacles. Have they ever disavowed their purpose? Is there any evidence that they have suspended their efforts? Southern men cry out that they

go for the Union at all hazards and under all circumstances, even at the sacrifice of slavery. That the States have no right to secede. That the Union is obliged to hang together, come weal or come woe. Who has not sense enough to see, that if this doctrine is established, the Abolitionists will be emboldened, and that the institution of slavery is doomed to fall before their incessant aggressions? These are the men fellow-citizens who under the disguise of Union, Union men, Union party, would set your neg.oes free, would place them upon an equality with yourselves, to involve your country in bloodshed and ruin, to burn your dwellings at night, to violate and butcher your wives, to intermarry with your sons and daughters. Beware of such, they come before you always as Union men. By this mark you may know them.—Choctaw Standard.

The names of the voters be regularly ascertained as they vote, and the list preserved.  
If two or more tickets, in counting the votes, be found rolled up together, or more names be found written on any ticket than ought to be voted for, all such tickets are not to be counted.  
No voter shall be allowed to use more than a single ballot, or piece of paper in the same box or vessel; but a ticket is to be counted though it contains fewer names than are to be voted for.  
If any manager shall knowingly receive an illegal vote, or shall refuse to receive a legal one, or shall neglect or refuse to attend the election, or shall count the ballots before the proper time, or at any other than the proper place, he shall be liable to penalties.  
Managers are authorized to administer oaths and examine witnesses to maintain order and regularity at the polls; and by order in writing, (directed to the Sheriff, Constable or Special Deputy) to commit to jail, for one day, any person who refuses to obey the lawful commands of the managers, or disturb their proceedings.  
If any person refuses to make proper oaths, or if the managers be otherwise satisfied that he is not qualified his vote shall be rejected.  
The managers or any other person entitled vote, may challenge any person offering to vote.  
In case of death, removal from the District, or refusal to serve of any manager, a majority of the Delegation are authorized and required to fill up the vacancy by appointment in writing.  
Polls to be opened at 9 o'clock A. M. and closed at 4 P. M. with convenient intervals. The box vessel or bag to be sealed up when the polls are closed not to be opened except to receive votes the second day, and to count the vote at the regular time and place.  
2. Resolved, That the managers of elections, prior to their proceeding to the elections do take the following oath or affirmation before some magistrate, or one of the managers of election to-wit: "That they will faithfully and impartially conduct and attend to the foregoing elections agreeably to the Constitution of the State of South Carolina and the laws thereof."  
Resolved, That the two years residence required by the Constitution in a voter, are the two years immediately previous to the election, and the six months residence in the election District, are the six months immediately previous to the election; but if any person has his home in the State, he does not lose the right of returning, but if one have his home and family in another State, the presence of such persons, although continued for two years in the State, gives no right to vote.
