A Man of 1776 .- In the war of the Revolution, Henry Peyton of Virgina, lost three sons. When the intelligence was brought to him that his third and last son was slain, he walked from the messenger agonized with grief, but suddenly, stifling his emotions, he turned and said, "Sir, much as I deplore the loss of my poor boy, I would to God I had another to supply his place, though he likewise perished in the cause of his country."

An eloquent mini-ter of the Gospel paused in the middle of his sermon, and remarked; "If I were at home, (meaning his own church,) I would say something about going to sleep, but as I am not, I forbear."

In an instant, heads, which had been quietly resting on the adjacent pewbacks, straightened up with military precision. The preacher concluded his remarks without further annoyance.

Mormon Progress.-The progress of the Mormons is like the gathering snow ball. Mr. Taylor, one of the Mormon missionaries sent out from the Salt lake Valley, writes from Eurepe that two large establishments are fitting out in London for the city of Salt lake. One comes out for the purpose of manufacturing broad and other cloths, merinos, alpacas, and other fabrics of that discription, together with shawls, blankets, flannels, &c. The other establishment spoken of comes out for the purpose of manufacturing sugar from the beet toot, on the same principle as in France. These will require a great deal of machinery, which it is contemplated to bring out together with men to work it, the object being to manufacture everything to be required in the valley, so as not to be necessitated to purchase it elsewhere.
