The 9th Regiment of Infantry will parade at Love's, on Saturday the 26th of July.
The Officers and Sergeants of the 2nd Brigade of Infantry, and 2nd Regiment of Cavalry, will assemble at such place as the Brigadier General of Infantry may direct, on Monday the 25th of July next, and encamp "full five days," commencing at 12 o'clock M.
The 2nd Regiment of Cavalry will parade at the place selected for the encampment, on Saturday, the 2nd of August next.
