The 10th Regiment of Infantry will parade at Richardson's, on Tuesday the 22d of July next.

The 7th Regiment of Infantry will parade at the Old Wells, on Thursday the 24th of July.

The 9th Regiment of Infantry will parade at Lowe's, on Saturday the 26th of July.

The Officers and Sergeants of the 2nd Brigade of Infantry, and 2nd Regiment of Cavalry, will assemble at such place as the Brigadier General of Infantry may direct, on Monday the 28th of July next, and encamp "full five days," commencing at 12 o'clock M.
