Later from Europe. ARRIVAL OF THE ARCTIC.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 21.

The American Mail Steamship ARCTIC has arrived at New York from Liverpool, which port she left on the 7th inst.

The British steam ship Amazon, from Southampton, for the West Indies had been consumed by fire at sea, and one hundred and thirty-one lives had been lost.

Universal tranquility prevailed in France.—The President had been shot at by a scabby, who had been taken a prisoner, sentenced to death by a court martial and shot.

Louis Napoleon is to be styled Emperor, and coins were in the course of being manufactured, which were to bear the inscription, "LOUIS NAPOLEON, EMPEROR."

It is said the Sovereigns of Europe have notified NAPOLEON that they are prepared to enforce that article of the Treaty of Vienna, which forbids any descendant of the Emperor NAPOLEON succeeding to the Imperial title.

The organ of the Government denies the truth of the statement, which had been promulgated to the effect that the President had received a congratulatory letter from the Emperor NICHOLAS of Russia.

The new constitution, it was expected, would have been declared on the 8th inst. American Cotton ships that have touched at English ports are to be admitted into French ports free of duty.

A large number of suspected persons had been arrested and sent to Cayenne. The statue of Liberty had been removed from the Chamber of Deputies.

The Emperor of Austria has abrogated the old constitution and was about to promulgate a new one.

The resignation of Lord Palmerston had caused great satisfaction at Madrid.

The Georgia Legislature on Intervention.—The Georgia House of Representatives, on the 9th, passed a preamble and resolution, from which we make the following extracts:

It has been the policy of the American Government, from its earliest existence, to maintain friendly relations with all, but entangling alliances with none, our true mission is not to propagate our opinions or impose upon other countries our form of government by artifice or force, but show by our success, moderation and justice, the blessings of self-government, and the advantages of free institutions.

We sympathize with the oppressed, we tender them a home, but never will we join with the ambitious or the revengeful in a crusade against other nations, however they may have oppressed their citizens. A departure from this safe and correct rule would involve our Government in endless disputes and wars, the result of which the wisest Statesmanship cannot foresee.

Intending our commercial relations we should have as little political connection as possible with foreign nations.

Therefore, resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives, of the State of Georgia, in General Assembly met, That his Excellency the Governor, be requested to forward the foregoing declaration of our principles to our Senators and Representatives in the Congress of the United States, with the request that they may be laid before their respective houses, as the opinions of the people of Georgia, as to the policy of our government, and that a copy be sent to the President of the United States.

Longevity in New Mexico.—Some facts developed by the census seem to show New Mexico to be one of the healthiest countries on the globe. Out of a population of 61,632, no less than forty persons are over 100 years of age; sixty are over 90 years, and 310 are over 80 years of age.

In Valencia country, Candelais Agutar, a farmer, was 130 years old, when the census was taken; Jose Ortado was 110; Rosa Billojos, 110; Rosa Montalio, 106; Maria J. Pacheco, 103. The males attain a greater age than the females, for of the 314 over 80, 107 are males and 117 females.

CANCER.—This terrible disease is said to have greatly increased in England during a few years inasmuch that a Cancer Hospital has just been established in London, and is already effecting an immense deal of good. In 1850, before this Hospital was established, no less than four thousand five hundred and eighty-six persons died in England, of this frightful malady. Of these, three thousand two hundred and twenty-eight were males.

OBITUARY. Died, in this town, of Consumption, on Tuesday Evening 20th inst., DOUGLAS MINTON, Jr., in the 22d year of his age.

The deceased was a consistent member of the Methodist Church. Of a quiet, unobtrusive character, he pursued the even tenor of his way through life, and died at peace with all men, and as we have reason to believe from his dying words, with the full assurance of his acceptance with God. He was not afraid to die. The Christian's triumph is in death. Though he may be little known beyond his immediate circle, he is not a stranger to the Lord of Lords, and the King of Kings. This is worth infinitely more to the immortal spirit, about to change worlds, than all earth's hoarded treasures, or the imaginary joys of a long life in sin.

Let me die the death of the righteous, and may my last end be like his.
