masters by the qualified voters in the respective localities in which post offices are situated: Provided, That if, in the opinion of said committee, Congress has already such constitutional power said committee shall, instead of said amendment, report, within the time aforesaid, a bill to effect the aforesaid object."

Modesty.-There is a resistless charm in a modest demeanor which is worth more than all the arts with which desinguing women seek to captivate the opposite sex. Meretricious attractions, may chance to please today; but native excellence, with the simple setting of modesty, will delight to-morrow, and next day, and so on, without interruption. Moreover, the pleasure which we derive from spurious shallow charms is almost certainly followed by disgust, when we come to see that we have been imposed upon. It is not agreeable to our amour propre to know and feel that we have been cheated. The old paradox about "beauty unadorned" has much truth in it, and is very pointedly and prettily rendered into the following epigram:

"As lamps burn silent with unconscious light, So modest ease in beauty shines more bright; Unaiming charms with force resistless fall, And she who means no mischief does it all!"
