WASHINGTON, Jan. 16, 1852.
My Dear Sir: I received your letter of the 12th inst., and although too weak myself to write in any comfort, I cannot forbear, through the pen of a friend, expressing to you my grateful acknowledgements for the friendly sentiments contained in your letter.

I consider my condition as highly critical.—It is a cough of some eighteen months duration, proceeding from the lower bronchial vessels; it has reduced me in strength and flesh, diminished my appetite, and lessened my sleep; it must be arrested, or it may terminate fatally, I think the cough is somewhat diminished, and I have certainly felt more comfortable within the last fortnight. I beg you to be assured again of my sincere thanks and profound gratitude.

KOSUTH COMING SOUTH.—It is said that after his visit to Pittsburg Gov. Kosuth will proceed to Columbus, Cincinnati, St. Louis and New Orleans, stopping at several intermediate places. He hopes to be in Boston in March or April, the exact time is uncertain, and he may be prevented, altogether, by movements in Europe rendering his earlier departure necessary.
