The latest news received from London by telegraph on the morning the Pacific sailed, states that reports of a threatened invasion of England by Napoleon were quite current, and that the Government had ordered 30,000 stand of arms from Birmingham, and would concentrate 25,000 troops in London. The Daily News says that orders have been sent to recall three of the principal ships of war stationed in the Tagues, with all despatch, to the coast of England.
