ions, the total increase of the land forces will be 4,900 men. It was reported that the Government was about to apply to the Chambers for a credit of six million of francs for the establishment of an intrenched camp in the environs of Antwerp, and for putting into a state of defence the tete de Flanders.

Several of the Swiss journals reiterate a report that had obtained considerable currency, to the effect that the Federal Council had demanded the intervention of Great Britain against France, and that the French Minister was preparing to depart. The French Cabinet has presented a note complaining of the hostility of the Swiss press to Louis Napoleon.

The forts of Milan are to be immediately completed, and every preparation made for the eventuality of war.

The Russian force in the Baltic at the present moment numbers forty-two sail of the line, all powerfully equipped, ably manned, extensively stored, and ready for action.

The Paris correspondent of the London Times affirms that the Government of Louis Napoleon is not on good terms with the Emperor of Russia, and that a decided coolness exists.

## From the Concord Mercury. Plank Road Meeting in Concord.

Agreeable to previous arrangements, a respectable meeting of the citizens of Concord assembled this evening, in the court house, for the purpose of holding a Plank Road meeting and to adopt Resolutions indicative of the sentiment prevailing in this vicinity with regard to this sub-

Caleb Phifer, Esq., was called to the Chair and E. F. D. McRee appointed Sceretary.

Maj. Rufus Barringer explained the object of the meeting, and several addresses were delivered in belalf of our contemplated projects in the way of Plank Roads.

The following resolution was offered by R. Barringer, and unanimously adopted-

Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting it is highly essential to the interests of the town of Concord and to the county of Cabarrus, to form connection, by means of a Plank Road, with the proposed Roads from Cheraw and Fayetteville, to near the mouth of Rocky River.

On motion of Mr. W. F. Taylor, a committee of the whole was appointed to attend the meeting of the Fayetteville and Centre Plank Road, to be holden at Centre sometime during the en-

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be published in the 'Concord Mercury' and 'Wadesboro' Argus.'

The meeting was then adjourned to meet at the call of the Chairman. CALEB PHIFER, Chairman.

To Raise Asparagus .- Procure the seed of the "Giant Asparagus." let them soak in pretty warm water, for 24 hours, add to the water about a handful of strong soot, which fixes the Glutine contained in the seed, and is good for garden seeds generally. Have a bed made of sufficient size for containing the seed, which must be sown in small furrows, one inch in depth, and 18 inches apart, covering them up, and pressing the earth with the back of the hoe, or spade. keep them clear of grass and weeds, give the bed one or two slight top dressings of salt during the season, by October the 20th, or thereabouts, It is said that Gov. Kossuth has contracted

with some two or three manufacturers in Cincinnatti for one thousand saddles, at \$12 each. they will be of sufficient size for planting out; which may be done as follows: Dig up your land 18 inches deep, (called trenching.) rake it over neatly, open furrows 10 inches deep, and 4 or 5 inches wide, the rows being two feet asunder, dig up your plants with all their roots, plant them in the furrows, with the crown of the plant two inches below the sur'ace; let the root spread out a little, at the side of the trench root spread out a little, at the side of the trench then cover them up, and give the bed a good top dressing of stable manure; then top 'dress with salt, until the bed looks white. In February they will put forth, but do not cut them the first year; give a top dressing of salt about 1st of July, gather the seeds when ripe, and about the 1st of November top dress with warm stable manure, and the next spring you will have GENDELL. fine asparagus. Winnsboro' Register.

ANSON PLANK ROAD .- We understand the contract for building the above road has been awarded to Maj. MACFARLAN, at a price a little over the Engineer's estimates. The contract curbraces the entire superstructure and materials at the sum of \$57,000. The work, we understand, is to be commenced forthwith and pushed to its completion.
