

sions." It is no longer an affair of the "Evangelicals" and "Exeter Hall."

On the other hand, the Catholic press, the Bishops in their pastorals, and the "Defence Association," while they do not deny that there is an extensive and hourly spreading secession, deprecate it in quantity, and quality,—and have announced an organization which they feel confident will counteract and eventually annihilate it. They assert that those who have seceded, are mainly the destitute, and that bribery is the means used to lead them away from the Church of their fathers. Religious, of different orders, being thickly scattered over those parts of the country where the "missions" are in operation. The Christian Brothers open their schools, and the Sisters of Mercy theirs—to supplant the educational and industrial schools of the "prosecutors." And the entire weight of the Defence Association—the influence of the Hierarchy, and the funds supplied by the Catholics of the United Kingdom—will be brought to prevent this threatened national apostasy.

I do not recollect at any former period—not even in the Bible discussion period of '25 when Bishop Coyle set on foot a warfare that made the entire people a nation of polemics,—and perhaps there has not been, at any time, since the Reformation,—the mind of the religious public of the United Kingdom so intensely concentrated on any Irish movement, as on this religious warfare, its progress, and issue. It is looked on as a matter of life and death with both Churches.—If successful, it will save the Irish Church Establishment; and will deprive the Roman Catholic Church of her boast of being the National Church of the Irish people.

TELEGRAPHIC INTELLIGENCE.

Latest from Europe.

ARRIVAL OF THE NIAGARA.

NEW YORK, MARCH 17.

The steamship Niagara arrived at Halifax at 4 o'clock this afternoon, with Liverpool dates to the 6th.

Cotton had advanced an eighth (1-8d) New Orleans Fair, 5 5-8; Middling, 5 1-4; Upland, Fair, 5 3-8; Middling, 5. The sales of the week were 79,000 bales, of which Speculators took 2000 and Exporters 4000. [Hollinshead's Circular quotes the advance in Cotton as 1-8 a 3-16; Middling Mobile, 5 5-8; Middling Upland, 5 1-16.]

Trade in the Manufacturing Districts was healthy.

The Anti-Corn Law League had been revived, and £4000 had been subscribed at Manchester for the agitation of the question. The new Ministry were cautious in expressing any opinion on the subject.

Five Days Later.

ARRIVAL OF THE PACIFIC.

NEW YORK, MARCH 21.

The steamship Pacific has arrived with Liverpool dates to the 10th inst.

At Liverpool Cotton was in fair demand, but the Canada's advances had flattened the market, and holders were more anxious to realize. The sales for the three days were 21,000 bales.—WRIGHT and CORNER's circular of the 9th, quotes Fair Upland and Mobile, 5 3-8; Orleans, 5 5-8; Middling Upland, 5; Mobile, 5 1-8; Orleans, 2 1-4. Trade at Manchester was firm, the business was moderate, and the stock light.

The Pacific passed the Baltic on the 17th. The Canada arrived at Liverpool on the 8th.

France was quiet. The fusion of the two branches of the Bourbon family is about to be accomplished. The Swiss staff officers on a visit to Paris are ordered to return to Switzerland forthwith. The difficulties between France and Switzerland are temporarily arranged. Three hundred more exiles have been despatched to Algiers.

A serious conspiracy to overthrow the Austrian Government was on foot, and troops were moving. Every pass between Turkey and Austria was guarded.

From England there is nothing new.

HO! FOR FLORIDA.—Several of our best Edgefield families have determined upon removing to this land of flowers, as early in the coming Fall as the nature of the case will admit. There is a small mania getting up on the subject, and we would not be much surprised if a little emigrating colony were the result.
