

The bill to establish and encourage man-
factories in the State was passed. No
provision for raising additional revenue was made,
and, in consequence, the State Treasury, it is
said, will be bankrupt a year hence. The Senate
reconsidered the bill to submit to the people
the question of the payment of the Planters
Bank Bonds. The bill was amended so as to
submit to the people at the Presidential elec-
tion, the question, "will you submit to a direct
tax for the payment of the Planter's Bank
Bonds?" and in this shape the bill was passed.
Gen. Foote has signed the bills granting the
right of way to the New Orleans, Jackson and
Great Northern Railroad Company, and to the
Memphis and Charleston Railroad Company.

FAMILY INTERMARRIAGE.—On this subject the
Fredericksburg News says:
"In the country in which we were raised, for
twenty generations back a certain family of
wealth and respectability have intermarried,
until there cannot be found in three of them a
sound man or woman. One has sore eyes, another
scrofula, a third idiotic, a fourth blind, a fifth
bandy legged, a sixth with a head about the
size of a turnip, with not one of the number
exempt from physical or mental defects of some
kind. Yet this family perseveres to intermarry
with each other with these living monuments of
their folly constantly before them.
"It is often done ignorantly by the best peo-
ple. Young people never reflect upon conse-
quences, and old people are too avaricious to for-
bid a match where money is gotten.
"Let the law reach it, and it will be stopped."

The case in the New Orleans duel, by which
Dr. Hunt killed John Frost, has been dismissed.
One of the papers says:
Judge Larue excused himself and would not sit
in the case. Judge Strawbridge declared that
he was too unwell to attend, and Judge Buchanan
stated that he had no time. Under these cir-
cumstances, the District Attorney said that he
believed he had done his duty in the matter, but
he could not try the case without a Judge. He
would therefore move to dismiss the accused.—
Judge Larue then ordered the case to be dismissed.

**Qualifications of Voters for Inten-
dant and Wardens of the Town of
Camden.**

BY A. A. 1824, it is enacted, "That from and after
the passage of this Act, every white man who is
by the Constitution of this State entitled to vote
for members of either branch of the Legislature, shall be
entitled to vote for Intendant and Wardens of the town
of Camden, any law, usage or custom to the contrary
notwithstanding. Provided such person so offering to
vote as aforesaid shall have resided in said town one
year immediately preceding the election of said officers;
the persons so voting, if required, shall produce to the
managers of election a certificate from the Intendant or
Recorder of said town, of his having performed patrol
or road duty, or paid an equivalent for not doing so,
within said town.
By A. A. 1825, it is enacted, "That from and after
the passing of this Act, every free white man of the
age of 21 years, who shall be possessed of any real es-
tate within the town of Camden, for which he shall
have paid to the town any tax for the year immediately
preceding, shall be entitled to vote for Intendant and
Wardens of said town, and every officer who may be
elected by the citizens thereof."
**Qualification of Voters for Members of the Le-
gislatre.**
Every free white man of the age of 21 years, (pau-
pers and non-commissioned officers, and privates of the
United States excepted) being a citizen of this State
and having resided therein two years previous to the
day of election, and who has a freehold of fifty acres of
land, or a town lot of which he has been legally seized
and possessed at least six months before such election,
or not having such freehold or town lot, hath been a
resident in the election district in which he offers to
give his vote, before the election six months, shall have
a right to vote for a member or members to serve in
either branch of the Legislature for the election district
in which he holds such property or residence.
The two years residence required by the Constitu-
tion in a voter, are the two years immediately previous
to the election, and the six months residence in the
election district are the six months immediately previ-
ous to the election; but if any person has his home in
the State, he does not lose the right of residence by
temporary absence with the intention of returning;
and if he has his home in the election district his right
to vote is not impaired by a temporary absence with
the intention of returning. But if one has his home
and family in another State, the presence of such per-
son although continued for two years in the State, gives
no right to vote."
