

and Mobile shake off their slumbers and buckle on their armor to enter the lists, and it is well known that almost all the additional freight or travel that goes to Charleston, pays an increased rate of profit to the South Carolina Railroad. But it is useless to argue either the present prosperity or future prospects of this Railroad; the strongest proof of both is found in the fact that sagacious men seek it as an investment, and that it is very difficult to procure, except in very small parcels and under peculiar circumstances.

There is no doubt, as far as I can learn, that the town of Camden can retain this stock without any inconvenience, as long as it pleases; certainly long enough to realize par value for any portion it may be deemed advisable to sell after mature deliberation, unless the reckonings of business men are sadly incorrect; and that the opinion of our own citizens, our own tax-payers, is that the stock will continue to appreciate, is evidenced by the fact that they do not sell their private investments in the Road. Our merchants realize more than 7 per cent. on their business, and if they believe that 60 per cent is the full value of the stock, why do they not sell out and invest in their business? I suppose that there are few of them who have debts less pressing than the debts of the town.

The town now pays but little over six per cent per an. on her indebtedness. A sale of the Railroad stock would be equivalent to raising a fund upon a rate of interest of nearly eight per cent. The stock (\$14,300) at 7 per cent realizes an income of \$100.1. The proceeds of a sale at \$90 per share (\$12,870) would realize at the same rate \$900.90. Does this look like a step towards the reduction of taxes? It strikes me that a few more such "lucky hits" would put the town in debt with nothing to rely on but taxation.

It has been suggested that it would be well to sell this stock and invest the proceeds in some other improvement, to advance the interests of the town. If this were the object I should not object to the end, but would most strenuously to the means, as any company, either Plank Road or Railroad, would be glad to take this stock as a subscription at par; but how can any one believe that those who are striving to "reduce taxation" can be induced to embark in a new enterprise, or that those who are willing to be taxed for the good of the town will consent to be so taxed with the anticipation that their interests will be again sacrificed. But I have done; with all the past binding me to "old Camden," I have deemed it my right and my duty to say this much, I shall not be disappointed if the torrent be not stopped, but I shall feel when the evil hour comes, when we gather the fruits of our activity in this matter, of our supineness in all else, "Thou canst not say, I did it."

P. S. On referring to the last Report, I find that my statement of the affairs of the Railroad is sufficiently accurate for the purpose; the capital and interest bearing debt are over \$600,000, but the net income of last year is over \$600,000. The current expenses 39-7-100 per cent instead of 40 per cent and the surplus fund, \$350,000.

TELEGRAPHIC INTELLIGENCE.

ARRIVAL OF THE FRANKLIN.

New York, April 27.—The steamship Franklin has arrived with Liverpool dates to the 14th. There had been a decided improvement in the cotton market, the sales for the three days amounting to 22,000 bales; viz on the 10th, 11,000; 12th, 5000; 13th, 6000. Of this, Speculators and Exporters took 6000 bales. The market closed very firm, and at a shade advance. Wheat was firm, as there was but a moderate supply. Flour was unchanged. Rice, 16 a 19s. The Money Market was glutted, and Consols had nearly reached par, closing at 99 5-8, while all sorts of securities were rapidly rising in price. The accounts from the provinces respecting trade are satisfactory. Business at Manchester is firm, though operations are languid. Advices from Calcutta state that the English expedition of 6000 men would start against Burmah on the 19th March.

The Portuguese steamer Oporto was wrecked near Lisbon and thirty persons perished, only seven escaping. Saldanha's Ministry had been defeated by the Cortez, and had tendered their resignation, but the Queen refused to accept it, and authorized Saldanha to do whatever he thought best. Whereupon he dissolved the Cortez.

The news from France is not interesting. The president pursues the same arbitrary course as heretofore. The steamer Islay sailed with 350 prisoners for Algeria. Portions of the Orleans estates have been taken possession of by Government agents. A grand review of troops was to take place on the 10th of May, when it was surmised Louis Napoleon would be declared Emperor.

The steamer Washington had not arrived out. The captain of a Quebec vessel reports seeing two vessels drifting in the ice towards Davis Straits in the spring of 1851, which he believes to have belonged to Sir John Franklin's expedition. The London Times doubts the story.

The Australian gold mines are yielding the precious metal in unprecedented quantities. The Havre cotton market was firm.

ARRIVAL OF THE NIAGARA.

BALTIMORE, April 28.—The Royal Mail steamer Niagara has arrived at Halifax from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 17th of April. The sales of Cotton for the week amounted to 49,000 bales, of which speculators took 4000, and exporters 7000. New Orleans Fair is quoted at 5 5-8d; Middling, 5d; Upland Fair, 5 1-8d; Middling, 4 3-4d. The demand was good and prices still. The sales on Friday, the 16th, reached 12,000 bales.
