The jury very properly found for the defendanta.

I regret much that the decisions in this State had not held that the company is not liable unless it be shown that the injury was the result of actual negli-gence on the part of the runner, and that the burden of showing this should be on the Plaintiff.

Such a rule would prevent recoveries in many instances where, if the truth could be reached, the Plaintiff ought not to recover, but where as the rule now stands a recovery will invariably be had.

AN ORDINANCE,

To REGULATE LICENSES FOR TAVERNS, RETAIL-ING SPIRITUOUS LIQUORS, BILLIARD TABLES, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES THEREIN MENTION-

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Camden, and by the authority of the same, that from and after the passing of this Ordinance, there shall be in the Town of Camden two classes of Licenses for the retailing of spirituous liquors, as follows: Number one, shall be the Tavern License, and may be granted to any person who shall keep a public house for the entertainment of travellers, boarders and other persons, in good faith, and who does actually entertain such persons. Each person applying for this License shall be required before taking out the same, to swear that during its term he or she will permit no gambling in their house or on their premises, and will use all lawful endeavors to prevent the same: and at the expiration of said License shall, before a renewal of it be granted, make oath that for the last 12 months previous, there has been no gambling in their house or on their premises with their knowledge or consent. For this License there shall be paid to the Town Treasurer the sum of seventy-five dollars annually, and five dollars fee to the Recorder.

SEC. 2. That License number two shall authorize the person to whom the same may be granted, to vend spirituous liquors in any quantity not less than one quart, not to be drank on the premises where sold nor any adjoining yard or building. For this License there shall be paid to the Town Treasurer the sum of fifty dollars anuually, and five dollars to the Record-

SEC. 3. That any person desiring either of said Licenses, shall apply by petition to the Town Council, setting forth such desire, which class of License he desires, and where he shall vend, naming his sureties, who shall be free-holders of the town, and shall accompany his petition with the recommendation to Council to grant the prayer thereof of three neighboring freeholders, who shall not be his sureties, and shall deposite the price of his license with the Recorder before the same shall be granted.

SEC. 4. That no License shall be granted without a full and perfect compliance with all the requisites contained in the third section, nor until notice of such application has been published one week in the newspaper of the place, nor until the second reading of the application before Council.

Sec. 5. That all Licenses shall be void the grantees of which do not comply fully with the law of the State of South Carolina respecting the oath to be taken by vendors and retailers. SEC. 6. That all Licenses shall expire on the

31st day of December next following their being granted.

SEC. 7. That the same persons shall not be sureties on more than two bonds for Licenses.

SEC. 8. That no License granted by Council shall be transferred to another person or authorize selling in any other house than the one stated in the petition, without the consent and regulation by Council, to be had by petition to that effect.

SEC. 9. That a License to keep a Billiard Table may be had by petitition to Council, setting forth such desire and stating the building in which the table is to be kept, accompanied with the recommendation of at least three freeholders or housekeepers in the immediate neighborhood; which License, when granted, shall authorize the keeping a Billiard Table in the house designated; but it shall be unlawful to permit any person under eighteeen years of age to play thereat, and any such act upon being proved before Council and the party being heard in defence, shall forfeit said License, and upon proof being had of any gaming or betting at such table, the license shall be forfeited.- Each person applying for this License shall be required, before taking out the same, to swear, that during its

term he or she will permit no gambling in their house or on their premises, and will use all law ful endeavors to prevent the same; and at the expiration of said license shall, before a renewal of it be granted, make oath that for the last 12 months previous, there has been no gambling in their house or on their premises with their knowledge or consent.

SEC. 10. That there shall be paid for a Billiard License the sum of seventy-five dollars annually to the Town Treasurer, and a fee of five dollars to the Recorder, and License shall expire on the 31st day of December in each year.

SEC. 11. That all Licenses granted under this Ordinance shall be issued by the Recorder under the seal of the Town, signed by him and any two members of Council.

Sec. 12. That all honses and buildings wherein such Lice : sare granted, shall be open and subject to the inspection of the Town Recorder and any member of the Council at all times.

SEC. 13. And be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, that from and after the 1st January next, if any person or persons shall sell or retail any spirituous liquors within the corporate limits of Camden in any quantity less than three gallons, without having first obtained a license so to do from the Town Council of said Town, such person or persons, upon conviction, shall forfeit and pay for each and every such offence, not less than ten, and not more than fifty dollars.

Sec. 14. And be it further ordained that all persons violating the true intent and meaning of this Ordinance, shall, together with their sureties, be severally fined in the sum of not less than five, nor more than fifty dollars, for each and every offence. And if any person or per sons shall, after the passing of this Ordinance, give, sell, or deliver any spirituous liquors to a slave or free person of color, without the express permission in writing of the owner, guardian, or person having charge of such slave or free person of color, such person or persons shall be fined in the sum of not less than five, nor more than fifty dollars, for each and every such offence.

SEC. 15. Be it further or lained by the authority aforesaid that all ordinances or parts of ordinances for regulating Licenses for Taverns, retailing spirituous liquors, Billiard Tables, and for other purposes therein mentioned, otherwise few kegs Malaga Grapes, all of which will no s than the foregoing be and the same are hereby repealed.

Ratified in council assembled this the twenty eighth day of April, in the year of our Lord, eighteen hundred and fifty-two, and in the seventy sixth year of American Independance.
