

LATER FROM EUROPE.

Arrival of the Europa.

The British Mail steam ship Europa has arrived at New-York from Liverpool, which port she left on the 24th ult.

In the Liverpool, market Cotton had advanced an eighth of a penny. The sales since the departure of the Niagara on the 17th ult. comprised 69,900 bales, of which speculators took 13,000, and exporters 6000. The quotations were as follows: Fair Orleans, 5 3-4d.; Middling Orleans, 5 1-8d.; Fair Mobile, 5 3-8d.; Middling Mobile, 5d.; Fair Upland, 5 1-4d.; and Middling Upland 4 7-8d. On Friday the 23d ult., the market closed firm, but not buoyant. The sales on Saturday, the day the Europa sailed, were estimated at 7000 bales.

FRANCE.—The Government Organ announces officially that Louis Napoleon has no intention to establish the Empire.

AUSTRIA.—The Austrian Government has abandoned the prosecution against Kossuth's family, and given them permission to go to America.

ENGLAND.—The abolition of the penny stamp duty on newspapers, and of the tax of eighteen pence on each advertisement has engaged the attention of the House of Commons, but the subject for the present has been postponed. The Peruvian Legation in London has forbidden vessels to trade in Guano from the Islands of Lopez, Tierra, and Lobsierra without permission of the Peruvian Government. The overland mail from India had arrived in London and brought the intelligence that 234 emigrants from Madras to Mauritius had perished in consequence of the hatches of the vessel in which they were in, having been battened down during a storm on the 23d of December. The ship Britania had arrived at London from Australia with \$270,000 sterling in gold, and reported that another vessel was on the way with 8,000 ounces; and that emigrants from all quarters were pouring into that country.
