Dr. Peter Forcher was immediately sent for, and although he administered all that medical science could suggest, and paid the unfortunate sufferer every attention, she expired between twelve and one o'clock yesterday afternoon, having undergone the most excruciating agony.—We trust that this painful catastrophe may serve as a warning to all who may have anything to do with spirit lamps.
