PROCLAMATION.



EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT S. C.

OCTOBER 14, 1852.

WHEREAS the Congress of the United States did, by an act passed and approved on the twenty-third day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, enact, "that the Electors of President and Vice President shall be appointed on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of the year in which they are to be appointed."

And whereas, the Constitution of this State provides that the Electors shall be appointed by the Legislature:

And whereas the Legislature of this State will not be in regular session at the time prescribed by the aforesaid act for the appointment of Electors:

THEREFORE, be it known, That I, JOHN II. MEANS, Governor in and over this State, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution, authorizing the Governor, on extraordinary occasions, to convene the General Assembly, do issue this my PROCLAMATION, calling upon and requesting the Senators of the General Assembly whose terms of office have not expired, and those who have been now recently elected and members of the House of Representatives who have also been now recently elected to convene in Columbia, on the FIRST MONDAY in November next ensuing, that they may be present in the House of Representatives on the said Tuesday next after the said first Monday, to appoint Electors of President and Vice President of the United States, in conformity with the act of Congress aforesaid:

Given under my hand and the seal of the State aforesaid, at Columbia, the 14th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and in the seventy-seventh year of the Independence of the United States of America.
