MEANS, Governor in and over this State, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution, authorizing the Governor, on extraordinary occasions, to convene the General Assembly, do issue this my PROCLAMA-TION, calling upon and requesting the Senators of the General Assembly whose terms of office have not ex-pired, and those who have been now recently elected elected and members of the House of Representatives who have also been now recently elected to convene in Columbia, on the FIRST MONDAY in November next ensuing, that they may be present in the House of Representatives on the said Tuesday next after the said first Monday, to appoint Electors of President and Vice President of the United States, in conformity with the act of Congress aforesaid:

Given under my hand and the seal of the State afore-said, at Columbia, the 14th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight [L. S.] hundred and fifty-two, and in the seventy seventh year of the Independence of the Uni-
