GENERAL ORDER NO. 11.

To the Commissioners of Roads for Kershaw District.

GOVERNOR PERRY, BY HIS PROCLAMATION of the 20th July, has declared that all civil officers of South Carolina who were incumbents in May last, are re-instated in their offices; and that the civil law of the State as it existed in "May last" is in full force and vigor; and calls upon all officers of the State to discharge their duties promptly.

In obedience to this Proclamation, the Commissioners of Roads will promptly call out all persons liable to work the Roads, and put the same in good repair, and restore all Bridges now in bad order. When the roads in any Division are subdivided to the owner of lands, the Commissioner will direct and see to it that those roads are put in repair immediately.

The Board will meet at Camden on Monday the 2d day of October next, when each Commissioner will be prepared to report on the state of the Roads and Bridges in his Division.

GENERAL ORDER NO. 6.

IT HAVING COME TO THE KNOWLEDGE of the General Commanding, that a large amount of property, formerly belonging to the so called Confederate Government, is now in possession of Citizens within this District, it is hereby ordered, That all such property, of whatever description, be immediately reported to the nearest Marshal in the District, by person or person having it in possession, that an exact account may be taken of the same for the future disposition of the Government.

Assistant Provost Marshals are directed to arrest all persons who fail to comply with the above order, and take them to the Sub-District Superior Provost Court for trial.
