

Interesting From Washington.

We get the following items from the Washington correspondent of the "Baltimore Sun":

A proclamation may shortly be expected from the President declaring the insurrection of rebellion in the South to be an end.

I can say that the President endorses the statement of Governor Perry of South Carolina concerning his (the President's) views as to the admission of Southern representatives to Congress. The President holds that the mass of them can take part in the organization of the House. I need not repeat the usual argument in this behalf, which he fully agrees to.

It is thought by some that the victory of the republicans in New York and New Jersey will so elate them that they will rudely repulse the Southern representatives from seats in Congress. But the better opinion is that their assured ascendancy will be best maintained by acting with moderation and justice. Any course that shall go to discourage and depress business interests in the South, will excite so strong a sentiment of sympathy among the business men of the North as may readily change political results at the next elections.

I doubt not the President will urge the reception of the Southern representatives and will make a key point of it in politics if it is found necessary. Those who are opposing this feature of his policy will never be warm in their support of him hereafter. He may overlook or disregard matters that he conceives to be of secondary importance to the great purpose of having the Southern people again represented in Congress, but for the latter object he will be firmly fixed in principle and tenacious to the last of effecting it.

THE FENIAN EXCITEMENT IN CANADA.—The good people of Canada are very much excited over the late movements of the Fenians in the United States. They are really impressed with the belief that their own soil is likely to be invaded by a mighty host who shall make their welkin ring in a land beyond the water. The officials, it appears, have taken steps to prevent any sudden surprise from the Fenians, and have published to the world at large their apprehensions of the future. In the meantime, the brotherhood are steadily and perseveringly at work in New York and elsewhere perfecting their arrangements. What will come of all this excitement will, doubtless, develop.

TRIBUTE OF RESPECT.

At a meeting of the Wards and Vestry of "Grace Church," held on the 18th November, 1865, the following resolutions were passed:

Whereas, it has seemed wise to the "Great Head" of the Church to remove from our earthly companionship on the twelfth day of November instant, the Assistant Rector of this Church, the Rev. Thos. F. DAVIS Junior.

Resolved, That by the death of our beloved rector, this church has sustained a very severe loss. He fulfilled his duties to this congregation with uncommon and unbounded zeal; he spared not his mental or physical labors in performance of that duty; he satisfied all, and had the perfect reverence and love of his people; his loss to them is the cause of heart sorrow, dejection and distress.

He was able, with a lofty and wide range of thought; he was gifted with talent of a high grade, which was severely drawn on, for the benefit of the people of this church and the community in which he resided. His deep devotion to study and learning qualified him to lead and satisfy the minds of his congregation; and this he did with a clearness, forcefulness and eloquence which left but little more on the subject to be desired by his audience. His firm reliance on the will of God and His providence, pervaded his whole life, and caused him to seem elevated above life itself. His all halcyon piety and profound religious views and feelings made the adoration of his Maker the great end and object of his life; hence the precepts of the Redeemer, Jesus Christ, filled his heart, and flowed out in a glowing tide to the care, assistance and nurture of the poor, in heart or worldly goods. This was the good shepherd's practice. By no one will he be more deeply and sincerely mourned for, than by them.

His love for the people for whom he labored was sincere, and deeply felt; and yet with a benevolence which knew no bounds or limits, the melting heart of charity was ever open to all of human kind.

In his sermons he poured forth the ripe experience of a cultivated and earnest christian heart. He preached from himself, his own heart and his own experience, and hence those discourses filled the hearts of his christian hearers with the glow and reverence for the Saviour which he himself felt. When but recently he delivered a most touching sermon upon the text, "There remaineth there a rest for the people of God," he seemed to pre-empt from himself and his precarious state of health; and there was that profound glow of love and adoration of the Saviour—that perfect conviction that he would have the priceless privilege to enjoy this "Rest," that every christian heart in the assembly was warmed into love and rejoiced in the earnest conviction that rest and joy awaited the people of God after their faithful life was over.

He did all things well, and his good man has entered his "Rest," in the presence of his God.

Resolved, That these Resolutions be entered on the journal, a copy be sent to the family of the Rector and be published in the "Camden Journal."
