


Italian Tenor Who Will Sing at Our Forthcoming Chautauqua





BUT A FEW DAYS OF GRACE ARE LEFT

For Those Desiring Street Paving to Get Their Petitions In

At the first of last week the paving commission announced that new petitions for street paving would be necessary before the work can be continued. The notice of this was published in the daily papers and the property owners on certain streets were requested to draw up additional petitions. This has not been carried out and by way of a reminder that this work is the limit for these petitions to be presented, Chairman Horton of the commission gave out the following announcement to the press of Wednesday afternoon:

"The paving commission asked for petitions on certain streets. These petitions had been signed up, but were more or less incorrect. So the work has to be done over again. These petitions must be in the hands of the commission by the morning of the 10th of May. If the property owners on the streets outlined by the commission do not want the paving doubtless there are property owners on other streets who do. Forms of petitions can be obtained on application to the city clerk or to the chairman of the commission. These petitions must be signed now."

ANDERSON WILL REBUILD FACTORY

Brick Structure to Replace Plant Lost in Big Fire Tuesday.

When seen on the morning following the fire, Mr. T. Q. Anderson, one of the heaviest losers, stated that he intended to rebuild his horse collar factory at once. "This time," said Mr. Anderson, "I am going to build out of brick, and will make the place as near fire proof as possible."

Politics and Public Service.

Can you mix practical politics and public service? It is doubtful. Here are some illuminating reasons: Out of the travail of the flood that devastated the Miami Valley in 1913 came two cheering events of interest and value to all the American people. One was a nonpartisan graft-proof Flood Conservation Act for Ohio that set a new standard for the highest of all forms of conservation; the other was a city manager system of government for Dayton, the most pretentious attempt so far to run a city like a business. But what happened? Both of these measures put the spoilsman out of business. So he decided to start an open reason for the plum tree again. First he assaulted the conservation act. With cunning amendments he sought to put this measure on the auction block of partisanship. After a desperate fight the friends of flood prevention have won, and it is a victory that the whole country will applaud now turn to Dayton. For a year of economic administration, marked by conspicuous efficiency, the city manager idea must make a struggle for existence just because the politicians have lost their trough and want it set up again. We hope the charter plan will continue, because as we have already pointed out in Collier's, it has set a healthy precedent for city conduct. Dayton men saved the conservation act; it is the Dayton group that is now battling for good municipal government. There is something dauntless about the spirit of that town. It rose up serene and unafraid after the flood; it has always met disaster with a smile; it seems to be the place where public service is more than a phrase.—Co-Eds.
