The Anderson to Close For Chautauqua.
Announcement was made yesterday by Manager C. H. Bleich of The Anderson theatre that he would shut up shop during the stay in Anderson of the Redpath Chautauqua, which means that the doors of this moving picture house will be closed for a period of eight days, beginning tomorrow. The Anderson will reopen next Tuesday week.

They are required to pay their expenses by the sale of post cards which they carry with them. They have a trip of something like 11,000 miles ahead of them, and are traveling just a bit behind schedule.

The Rev. J. H. Gibbonney, rector of Grace church, who had been spending the week in Savannah, has been called to his old home in Virginia by the death of his sister.

Rainfall Friday Measured Two Inches.
The rainfall Friday measured exactly 2 inches, according to data given out yesterday by United States Weather Observer H. H. Russell. This was the first rain since April 11, at which time there was but a sprinkle. During the whole month of April the rainfall amounted to but one-third of an inch, which is not only lowest on record for this month but the lowest on record for any month since Mr. Russell has been weather observer here, and that has been about 10 years.

Mill Man May Return Here.
It was reliably reported yesterday that Mr. Thomas Henderson, formerly superintendent of the Fiverside Cotton Mills, who has been living in Lynchburg, Va., for some time, will return to Anderson.

Big Picnic Great Success.
The joint picnic yesterday at Dobbins Bridge of Roberts, Double Springs and Green Pond schools was one of the most enjoyable affairs of the kind that has ever been held in this section. A number of people from the city were in attendance, and addresses were made by the following Andersonians: Gen. M. L. Bonham, Senator J. L. Sherard, Sam'l L. Prince, Fred M. Burnett and County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton. It is estimated that 300 people were in attendance.

Mr. C. A. Mattison, who for some time has been boss weaver at the Anderson Cotton Mills, has resigned. It was stated yesterday, and will leave soon for Newry, where he has accepted a very flattering offer. His many friends in Anderson will regret to learn that he is to leave here.

Friday night when the fire bell rang, Messrs. Rhett Parker, "Sport" Cochran, and Blair Crayton were on their way home. They were almost home, but decided to return to town to see where the fire was. They walked briskly as far as Mr. W. W. Russell's, when they heard some one telling another that the fire was down at Parker & Bolt's store. Mr. Crayton said afterwards that Mr. Parker jumped at least four feet high when he heard that remark, and he lit running, and in three seconds the only thing he could see of Parker was the place he had been. Mr. Parker stated to a reporter for the Intelligencer Saturday that he knows he broke all records for the distance he ran; that while it was all down grade, he believes he could have made the same time Friday night if it had been up hill. He ran the three blocks in nothing-flat.
